MORE MEN WORK ON THE HIGHWAY

TEN MEN TAKE SUBCONTRACT AT HOT LAKE

Men Building Camp State That They Were Well Pleased with the Treatment Given Them

This morning a group of ten men started work on a sub-contract on the Hot Lake section of the highway. All of these men are men with families and reside in La Grande. Most of them are railroad men out of work who prefer going to work with pick and shovel to staying idle.

This brings three groups of Americans working on sub-contracts on the highway near La Grande. One group of seven men have been working near Perry for over a week and another group of eight men started to work on a sub-contract there several days ago, within a week or ten days other sub-contracts are expected to open up on the section of road under contract to Rajotte-Winters.

The men working on the Hot Lake contract will receive \$1 a yard for moving most of the dirt. There are about 5000 yards to be moved and about 4500 yards are to be paid for at \$1 a yard while about 500 yards of intermediate dirt will be moved at fifty cents a yard. There is not such hard rock on this section of the road as is to be found near Perry where \$1.30 a yard is being paid.

The carpenters and several others of local men who have been working for the Rajotte-Winters company building camps returned from the job Saturday, having completed the work. They stated that they were well pleased with the treatment accorded them and that the company provided them with the best of food. The contractors, it is reported, were well satisfied with the work done by the men.

A considerable number of men will be hired by the Security Construction company within a short time on the Hot Lake job. The Rajotte-Winters company will probably have around twenty men at

work by the day. At the latter's camps the wage per day for common labor is \$3.50, with board charged at \$1.50 per day. The Security Construction company is paying \$4 per day, with the same charge for board. Teamsters for the Rajotte-Winters company receive \$60 a month and board.

DOKIES TO HAVE

BIG TIME SOON

The biggest event the Dokie lodge has ever put on in Eastern Oregon is scheduled for La Grande May 25 when over three hundred Dokies from Umatilla, Grant, Malheur, Baker, Wallawa and Union counties will assemble here for a ceremonial in Rex hall. In the past the local lodge has been putting in its ceremonies in the cities where the classes of candidates to be initiated reside, but this time the candidates will come from far and near to La Grande.

The ceremonial, which will be in charge of Khalef Temple of La Grande, will be attended by delegations from other temples both in this state and other states. Among those who will send delegations will be Abd-Uhl-Atef Temple of Portland, Al Kindi Temple, of Walla Walla, Washington; El-Maharraz Temple, Spokane, Washington; Fuhat Burkan Temple, Medford; Omar Alkayim Temple, Lewiston, Idaho. All of these temples have assured the local temple that delegations will be here.

At the time of this ceremonial it is expected to have the new stage setting, recently contracted for, in readiness. This will be one of the finest settings of its kind owned by any temple. The design is Arabic. The new setting will be used only for ceremonials and other Dokie affairs put on here, it having been decided not to allow it to be moved out of La Grande.
