Freeman, who drilled the Piney-Creent oil well in the Dry Pine oil field, who is also manager of the Wyoming Oil Leasing Co., a Boston syndicate which is now moving a standard rig to their property in section 1, township 28, range 114."

"Mrs. Freeman's audience, naturally, was very appreciative, as it is seldom that an opportunity presents itself to hear an artist like her. The program follows:

"In compliance with special requests, the 'Flying Dutchman' was repeated."
