POULTRY CACKLES

DISINFECTING DOES NOT KILL

Painting Roosts and Droppings Bores of No Value in Destroying Chicken Parasites.

There have been many advocates of the theory that chicken lice can be killed by painting the roosts and droppings boards or the whole interior of the poultry house with various oil mixtures, the idea being that the vapors or gases arising from these points penetrate the feathers of the roosting fowls and kill the lice. This method has been given a very extensive trial by specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture, and not one of the 22 different preparations tested was found to be of any value. These preparations contained one or more of

the following ingredients: Phenol, tar oils, hydrocarbon oils, creosote oil, carbon disulphid, wood-tar distillate, benzol, nitrobenzene, naphthalene, nitrobenzene oil, and pyridine.

In these experiments the roosts and droppings boards or the whole interior of the house were thoroughly painted or sprayed just before the fowls went to roost, and all doors, windows, and ventilators were closed during the first night. Five badly infested fowls were used in each test, and at the end of one week examination was made for living lice. Although an occasional dead house was found on the droppings boards, in no case was the treatment of any practical value. Since many of these preparations were found to be effective when used as fumigants in small boxes, it is apparent that the ineffectiveness of house treatment is due to the fact that the fumes do not become concentrated enough to kill the lice. Tests were also made with these fumes applied in the same way; this also was found to be of no value.

Oil and Literature

We venture to say that the struggle for iron and oil will produce no such romantic results as Stewart Edward White's "Gold," nor such vivid California stories as those of Greg Zerk, for the Alaskan adventures tales of Rex Beach and Jack London, but it is a good too early for prophecy—it remains to be seen if oil and literature can mix.—Christian Science Monitor.

Teeth of Various Creatures

Rabbits have 28 teeth, and rats and mice 20 each. Sheep and oxen possess the same number as humans. Pigs have no teeth at all on the lower jaw, and treads are quite toothless. The shark has several rows of teeth, he outer ones being replaced as they become worn, at the expense of the inner rows. The pike is provided with what might be called blinged teeth, as they certainly can be turned inward to enable it to hold its prey firmly.
