Building Protects Auto Dealer—
Insurance to protect automobile dealers from loss through the confiscation of cars sold on deferred payments and seized by federal authorities as liquor carriers may be written in Oregon by surety companies, according to a ruling made Monday afternoon by A. C. Barber, state insurance commissioner. Surety companies, however, are the only ones permitted to write this class of insurance in Oregon at this time, and this insurance must be written in a policy entirely separate from other insurance.

"Great Basin" Region
What is known as the Great Basin of North America is an inland drainage in western United States, situated between the Wasatch mountains of the east and the Sierra Nevada and Cascade ranges of the west. It comprises most of Nevada and portions of Utah, Oregon, Idaho and California, and has a total area of about 200,000 square miles. The basin has a graded slope from the north, where the elevation is 4,000 feet above the sea, toward the south, forming a tilted plateau whose surface is broken by interrupted groups of mountains with a general north and south trend.
