ZWEIFEL TO SELL LAUNDRY-ETTE

With his motto emblazoned on everything he owns, even to his automobile, "I keep right up with the new things," Nate Zweifel, the Deleo dealer, yesterday contracted for the sale of the Laundry-Ette which is being introduced by Seattle people and a demonstration was on yesterday and today at the Zweifel store, one door north of the Lily hardware store.

The new machine has some features that are as old as the old washboard, but these have been whipped into shape and the motor does the work. Instead of having a wringer that pinches the clothes to wring them this machine has a centrifugal wringer that works much as a cream separator, the force of the whirl removing the water.

"I have been looking for a long time for just this kind of a rig," said Mr. Zweifel. "I had the plan of it in my head from the days of my youth when I turned the wringer and wondered if there was not an easier way to do the job. The Laundry-Ette is the easier way and I wish all the ladies would call at my store and see it work."

Paraffin Treatment for Burns.
 The use of a few drops of paraffin is an English physician's first aid suggestion for treating burns. The application can be made from a paraffin candle held at a height of seven or eight inches, but care is to be taken to avoid forming a coating so thick as to be undeniably hot. A piece of gauze or linen is spread over this layer, with another coating of paraffin outside.

BEST EGGS FOR INCUBATING

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
 Fertile eggs from vigorous stock are essential in good hatching. They are obtained only from stock properly mated and kept under the best possible conditions to secure health and vitality. Eggs from overfat breeding stock do not usually produce many strong chicks.

If breeding birds are confined, they should be fed a varied supply of grains, meats, and green feed. The green feed helps to keep fowls in good breeding condition, say poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. Free range is usually important in the production of hatchable eggs, as it is much easier to keep up the vitality of stock handled in this manner than in birds that are yarded.

From 8 to 12 females of the American or general-purpose class and 12 to 15 of the Mediterranean class can

be mated with one male, depending on his age and vitality and where the fowls are yarded, but this proportion may be increased where the birds have free range. Good ventilation in the house is a great help in keeping the stock in good breeding condition.

Should Select Uniform Eggs.
 Abnormal, small and poorly-shaped eggs should be discarded. Do not set eggs which have thin or very porous appearing shells. Eggs should be set when fresh, if possible, and it is not advisable to use eggs for hatching which are over two weeks old, although stale ones frequently hatch. Selecting uniformly large eggs of the same color is one of the quickest ways to secure uniformity in the offspring and increase the size of the eggs. It is well to clean dirty eggs by rubbing lightly with a damp cloth, taking care not to rub off any more of the natural bloom of the egg than is necessary. Duck eggs usually require washing, which does not appear to injure their hatching qualities.

Eggs for hatching should be collected two or three times a day in freezing weather to prevent chilling. Broody hens allowed to sit on eggs in the laying nests all day may hurt the hatching qualities of the eggs. For convenience in handling, eggs, in large numbers, are generally kept in a cabinet or turning rack, in a room where the temperature is between 50 and 60 degrees F. If possible, although they will stand wider variation, it is not necessary to turn eggs kept only for a few days, but this should be done daily with those over a week old. Various commercial turning devices are sold by poultry supply companies, or the eggs may be kept in cabinet drawers and shuffled about with the hands by removing a few eggs from the trays. Commercial egg cases sometimes are used for holding the eggs for hatching.

Eggs from different varieties of the same class of poultry may be hatched together, but it is not advisable to mix eggs from the Mediterranean or egg breeds, such as Leghorns and Minorcas, with Plymouth Rocks or Wyandottes, as the eggs from the smaller breeds often hatch a little earlier than those from the larger breeds. Neither the hen nor the incubator will hatch strong chicks from weak germ or from eggs which have not received proper care.

CAUSE OF TEAT AFFECTIONS
 Hands of Milker Should Be Kept Clean and Finger Nails Trimmed Quite Closely.

Milking with uncleaned wet hands is a fertile cause of teat affections. The teats and udder should be cleaned each time before milking and the milker's hands also should be kept clean. The finger nails of the milker should be kept close-trimmed and when milking care be taken not to squeeze the tips of the teats too hard. Such bruising is the cause of a condition which we have termed "sores" of the teats. The skin becomes hardened, horny or calloused and milking then becomes difficult, or the milk spaces during extraction. Dirty and contaminated stall floors and allowing cows to lie upon dirty, wet ground, or walls in stagnant water or drag their udders through wet and filthy sawdust in the stable are other causes. And a common cause of sores on the tip of the hind teats is bruises from stepping upon them when crossing a sill into the stable or by trampling in narrow stalls.
