Famous French Fortress.—Carrousses, the walled city beside the snows of the Pyrenees, is the most famous medieval fortress in France and has been preserved as a national monument. The old city stands on the summit of a hill overlooking plains in all directions, and is surrounded by two enormous walls, whose 52 pointed defense towers show completely the art of defense as understood between the Fifth and Thirteenth centuries. The Romans ruled here, then the Visigoths from Spain for three centuries, then the Saracens, and finally the French.

Webster's Place in History.—While acting as the organ of the government in foreign affairs Webster showed that his powers as a diplomatist were scarcely inferior to his legal and oratorical endowments, but it is as secretary of state that he is least thought of now. His country proudly thinks of him as one whose brain and voice did more to inspire Americanism than any other man between Washington and Lincoln; as the greatest Federalist since Hamilton; as the finest exponent of the Constitution since Marshall.
