PORTLAND, May 14.—The Board of Directors of the Portland Rose Festival Association have fixed June 8th to 10th as the date for this year's three-day fete. For fifteen years the Rose Festival has been the most important celebration in the Pacific Northwest, and ranks in beauty and entertainment features with the famous Mardi Gras of New Orleans, and

the New Year's Day floral parade at Pasadena.

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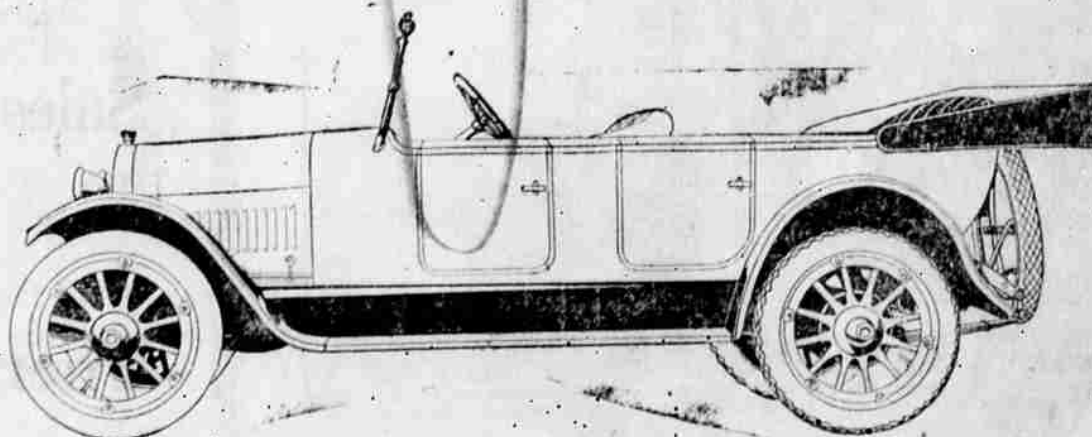
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
