Hikers Get Wet—

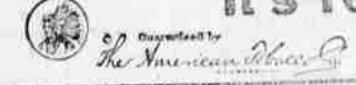

NOT BLAMED FOR SHOOTING

EUGENE, May 16. — Justifiable homicide was the verdict of the coroner's jury that held an inquest over the remains of Alfred Johnson, west Lane mountain bee rancher, who was shot and killed by Mazonia L. Smith, of Glendale, last Monday morning. Sheriff Siskels says the evidence showed that during the quarrel over the honey jars Johnson got his rifle and began shooting at Carl Allen, half-brother of Smith, and that Smith, in order to defend himself, began shooting at Johnson, three shots taking effect, two of which struck in vital spots. The remains of Johnson were buried near his cabin, where the shooting occurred.

District Attorney Johnson said that, inasmuch as the coroner's jury had completely exonerated Smith, no action will be taken by the grand jury.
