Breeder of large English White Leghorns, she takes pride in the blood and sees that the best of care is given the fowls. So scientific has she become in handling chickens that she can tell just what each hen is doing in the line of egg production.

Each has a number and, with the trap-nest system working, it is very easy to open the door after the egg has been laid, take the hen's number and enter it upon the daily schedule on the wall. Mrs. Chapman has many hens that are seven-day layers, which is rather remarkable, for the average hen will lay part of the week, some not working full eight hours a day and others demanding a forty-four hour week.
