### Embassadors of Thirty-four Nations Will Discuss World Trade Needs

To discuss the best methods of meeting the demands of European and other nations for raw materials and manufactured products, as well as extending the credit essential to economic normalcy, a conference of thirty-four nations has announced their intention of attending the first conference of World Trade to take place at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York City, May 18th, 19th and 20th.

The conference will be held in conjunction with the annual convention of the National Association of Manufacturers. This organization comprises 600 manufacturing concerns, which produce more than seventy-five per cent of the entire manufactured output of the United States. Through the meeting of ambassadors and ministers, members of the manufacturers' association, for the first time, will be able to obtain the foreign viewpoint at first hand.

Those countries whose ambassadors or ministers have accepted and will be fully represented, include Argentina, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, Bulgaria, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Finland, France, Great Britain, Greece, Guatemala, Italy, Japan, Netherlands, Nicaragua, Norway, Panama, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Roumania, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland and Venezuela.

Preceding this conference, there will be a discussion of many subjects of vital interest to the manufacturer, such as the sales tax, by Jules S. Bache, a financier of international prominence; the immigrant as an economic problem, by Frederick A. Wallis, United States Commissioner of Immigration for the Port of New York and others of national prominence and interest.

The conference will be presided over by Mr. Stephen C. Mason, president of the manufacturers' association, and has been so arranged that those representing other countries may explain to the men of this country most intimately concerned in financing and extending the foreign trade of the United States, just how the constructive forces of this nation can be coordinated to serve best the needs of the world.

In addition to this every facility will be furnished to the distinguished group to make known the particular trade possibilities and probable developments of the various countries to individual members of the association, and delegates to the convention. A special information section will be set apart where each nation may have on exhibit special literature and trade information for inspection. Plans also have been made to send this special information to any manufacturer who wishes it.

To conclude the conference, there will be addresses, taking the American viewpoint, by John McHugh, of the Foreign Trade Finance Corporation; Eugene Meyer, Jr., of the United States War Finance Corporation; Admiral William S. Benson, chairman of the United States Shipping Board and probably one other of national prominence.

### State News

The game warden, after a trip to Dark Lake, Central Oregon, declares that the report that the lake had been dynamited is all false. Rumors were that hundreds of dead fish were floating on the lake. The warden found only one fish, which he believed might have committed suicide.

Moonshine was responsible for a drunken brawl at Juntura, near Vale, during which Ed Enright, sheepherder, stabbed John Joyce, sheepman of Malheur county. Enright had been working for the Joyce brothers, and while in a drunken state, rushed at Joyce and stabbed him.

Because Mrs. Nettie Connitt, first woman convicted in Oregon as a moonshiner, failed to perfect an appeal, United States Attorney Lester W. Humphrey obtained from Federal Judge R. S. Bean an order for her commitment to jail, to which she was sentenced to six months in addition to being fined \$500.

A Baltimore, Maryland, dispatch tells of two adventure-loving women starting out on a hike around the world, which they figure will take six years. They were each supplied with a camping outfit. One of the women, Miss Myrtle King, is a daughter of Judge Will R. King, former justice of the Supreme Court of Oregon, who was at one time a resident of Baker.

Grandmother's way of hatching chickens to provide the famous fries that are so popular about harvest time is a good deal different from the way they're hatched in 1921 in Pendleton. There baby chicks are chipping shells in an incubator warmed by electric heat. Electrical heat for this purpose is not in very wide use, and the use of the machine in Pendleton is something of a novelty.

One of the costliest fires in Pendleton for many weeks occurred when the beautiful home of Bill Pedro in Riverside burned to the ground. The house was one of the most beautiful homes near Pendleton, and the loss is placed at \$20,000, with \$15,000 insurance. Starting a fire with coal oil is the probable cause of the fire.

The first big sale of wool in Umatilla county was reported when Alfred Smith, for the J. E. Livestock Company, sold 50,000 pounds. Ramer has it the price ranged between 20 and 24 cents.

J. C. Penney, founder of the chain of Penney stores, has been with his sister's children in Roseburg. His sister, Mrs. W. R. Staven, recently died. From Portland, Mr. Penney will go direct to his home in New York City.

The forest service has just issued a program for Forest Protection week, May 23, to be sent to all the teachers of Oregon and Washington. The pamphlet sets forth the purpose of Forest Protection week, gives data on the Northwest timber industry and the amount that is destroyed each year by forest fires, how these fires are started and how they may be prevented.

Suggestions are given as to how forest protection may be taught to the school children during the week, by special assemblies and distribution of forest literature.

Pendleton milk prices will drop a cent on each quart June 1, there will also be a cent off on all pint bottles sold.

Paul Knapp, of Eugene, father of two sets of twins, has filed complaint for divorce against Hazel Knapp, of Albany, mother of the children. He alleges cruel and inhuman treatment.

A chapter of "La Societe des 40 Homes de 8 Chevaux," a social branch of the American Legion, was installed at Eugene Saturday by a delegation from the Portland chapter, which has been the only one in the state. Sixteen members of the Lane county post were initiated.

There recently arrived in Pendleton probably the two oldest Indians in the Northwest. They are Kahi-yes, 125 years old, and his wife, who is but a few years the junior of her husband. The two are members of the Walla Walla tribe and are visiting relatives at the Unatilla Indian agency. Kahi-yes is blind and his wife is deaf, but otherwise the hand of time has dealt gently with the pair, who are hale and hearty.

Any employment by contractors engaged on Hood River county work of any but American citizens will, according to a resolution just adopted by the county court, render the contract void. The resolution stated that ex-service men were finding it difficult to get employment and that many jobs formerly held by them were now being held by non-citizens.
