CARPENTIER IS RICH MAN

A dispatch from Paris states that Georges Carpentier, who emerged from the war ruined and practically penniless, is now reported to be worth more than 3,000,000 francs, or a little over \$200,000 in real money all of which he has made since his fight with Joe Beckett.

Carpentier landed in the United States on Monday, to begin training for his battle with Dempsey on July 2, at Jersey City.

All his property in Lievin, just outside of Lens, was destroyed during the war and while mobilized he spent what savings he had to keep his mother and family, even getting into some debts, which his share of the purse for his fight with Dick Smith in June, 1919, just evened up. Carpentier has been touring Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Switzerland, Northern Africa and Spain and, under the keen business management of Descamps, has been raking in the paper francs. Descamps is working with Carpentier on a 40 per cent agreement.

CONNECTION OF TWO RAILROADS ARE TO IMPROVE AT MILTON

MILTON, May 17.—Corporations and business men of Milton and Freewater petitioned the public service commission for better transportation services between the Walla Walla Valley Railway company and the O-W. R. & N. company, and as a result the suggested connections will be made between the two roads.

WOULD LIST GRAVES OF OREGON DEAD

SALEM, May 17.—Colonel George A. White, adjutant general of Oregon, is to begin a systematic effort to locate the graves of deceased soldiers of all wars, and the result will be a permanent state record. Some of the graves are in foreign lands and some are in national cemeteries, while other nameless graves are in nearly all local cemeteries. The adjutant general estimates that 5000 graves of war veterans are in Oregon alone. The records of every burying place in the state will be examined.

DOKIE CEREMONIAL TO BE STAGED HERE WEDNESDAY, MAY 25

The local temple of Dokies has announced that for the great ceremonial to be held here on May 25 the champion shaman of the Northwest will be on hand to entertain the five hundred Dokies attending. The local temple's trained kennels and various other stunts of unusual novelty will also be on the program.

A program will be put on at six o'clock for the benefit of the public in the downtown section, a parade of between four and five hundred Dokies preceding the program. The new Arabic stage setting that is being made for the local temple will be finished at noon of the day of the ceremonial, and the public will be allowed to inspect it during the afternoon.

The banquet will be served at seven in the evening and from eight on the evening of the twenty-fifth to six in the morning of the twenty-sixth will be devoted to the ceremonial, which will be the biggest affair of the kind ever put on in eastern Oregon.

State News Gleaned By Salem News Bureau

(Observer Salem Bureau.)
SALEM, May 17.—Bids for road-building work aggregating an estimated cost of \$1,200,000 will be opened by the state highway commission at its meeting in Portland May 27. An effort will be made to complete the work this year. The projects follow:

Clackamas county—Pacific highway, Aurora-Canby section, 3.75 miles paving. Mount Hood loop—Multnomah county line to forest boundary section, three units, 22.8 miles grading. Coos county—Roosevelt highway, North Bend and Coquille section, 6 mile concrete pavement. Coos and Douglas counties—Roseburg-Coos Bay highway, Remote-Camas valley section, 1.4 miles rock surfacing, Douglas county—Pacific highway, Oakland-South section, 1.16 miles paving. Gilliam county—John Day river highway, Condon-north section, 6 miles grading and rock surfacing. Jackson—Crater Lake highway, Agate-Trail section, 14.35 miles rock or gravel surfacing. Tillamook highway, Dolph to Hebo, crushed rock maintenance surfacing. Union county—La Grande-Enterprise highway, Wallowa-Hill section, 5.48 miles grading. Yamhill county—McMinnville-Tillamook highway, Sheridan-Willamina section, 4.1 miles grading and paving. Sour Grass section, 6.8 miles grading and surfacing.

The public service commission has ordered the California-Oregon Power company to turn on its current for pumping water on the Grants Pass irrigation district, pending an investigation by the commission relative to

rates. The complaint to the commission said that the company had refused to turn on the current because of difficulty over a contract, and that crops were suffering as a result.

O. P. Horr, state treasurer, announces that on June 1 his office will open bids on \$121,275 irrigation drainage district bonds to cover state guarantee of interest on bonds of the Talent, Grants Pass, Warm Springs and Ochoco irrigation districts.

Through engineers and representatives of the city attorney's office, the city of Portland is making a careful examination of exhibits that were used in the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company rate hearing which resulted in the increase in rates. The data will be used by the city if the public service commission grants a rehearing of the case.

The total number of motor vehicles registered in the state from January 1 to April 30 was 95,580, according to a statement by the secretary of state and in addition there was listed the registration of 2171 motorcycles, 468 dealers, 2428 chauffeurs and 16,178 operators. The total amount of fees collected was \$1,993,549. During April 3750 motor vehicles were registered, and the amount received in fees was \$136,707. Added to this figure the registration of motorcycles, chauffeurs, dealers and operators and the recording of additional sets of license plates, transfers and duplicates, brought the fees for April up to \$145,490.25.
