THE HOME GARDEN

What is Home without a Garden?

Keeping Your Soil 100 Per Cent

It is presumed that anybody who starts a garden knows in a general way that it has to be manured in one way or another if it is to be kept at 100 per cent efficiency of production. What comes out of it must be replaced, and the establishment of this replacement fund, as a business man would call it, is the first garden problem after the seeds are planted and growth is established. It is becoming more and more of a problem every day. Commercial fertilizers do not solve it alone. They add fertility, giving the plants in quickly available form the food they need, but something else is necessary.

Barnyard manure is the perfect natural fertilizer because in addition to plant food it adds the essential element of fertility, humus, a constant supply of decaying vegetable matter. It becomes harder and harder with each succeeding

year to secure stable manure. However, grass clippings with withered weeds hoed from the garden, the autumn leaves, form the material practically blown in our faces to replenish the humus. Millions in fertilizer are blown away every fall, the scientists tell us. Woods soil, famous for its quality, is merely the natural decay of layer after layer of fallen leaves. All we need do is to save the leaves and clippings from the lawn in some secluded corner, moistening them from time to time, hastening the decay, and spreading them in when the ground is cleared in the fall to have it ready for spring.

Use the ashes from every bonfire of leaves or grass on the garden. Its potash is valuable and expensive to buy in a chemical salt.

But save the leaves and spread them in. Then with commercial fertilizers the ground may be kept at 100 per cent efficiency.

MANY TACTICS ARE EMPLOYED

WESTERN STATES TRY TO ATTRACT SETTLERS.

Oregon Is Favored This Year by Having A Representative On the Ground Who Protects State.

PORTLAND, May 17.—Many and various are the tactics employed in Omaha and Kansas City by western states in an effort to attract settlers to their undeveloped land—to such an extent, in fact, that a veritable "immigrant market" has developed in the twin gateways to the far west, according to preliminary reports received by the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce from the representatives in the middle west.

The States of Texas, Idaho, Western Kansas and Nebraska and California are leaving no stone unturned in their efforts to divert prospective settlers to their various communities, according to the report. Attractive literature available in large quantities at strategic points, and advertisements running in eastern papers of large circulation, indicate that a large amount of money is being expended.

The report carries with it a suggestion that there is a vital need for a more aggressive and systematic program in regard to settling the irrigated sections of the state.

"I doubt very much," writes J. R. Hearing in his report from Omaha, "if the average man in Oregon has given any thought to the fact that it is the easiest thing in the world to build an irrigation project and it is the hardest thing in the world to induce a man to move his family into a district and make himself and family a farm and home, and unless Oregon realizes the seriousness of this phase of the irrigation program that they are inaugurating, I would not venture to predict the successful outcome of any irrigation project that is completed, or that is about to be constructed, in the State of Oregon."

As a specific example of the above statement, the report cites the fact that one county in Colorado is now running an advertisement in a great many eastern papers offering irrigated farms for nothing down and nothing but interest to pay for a period of five years.

While this state has undoubtedly suffered in the past through lack of aggressive advertising as compared to competitive states, the interests of Oregon are well protected this year through having a representative on the ground. According to the report, there is a definite and consistent demand for information and literature in regard to the state in spite of the strenuous efforts put forth by other states to divert these homeseekers to other localities.

"I trust that from this brief outline of the competitive conditions that exist at this time," concludes the report, "some action can be taken by the state at large to help along in this movement which we are now getting under way, for more people mean less taxation; more people mean more money to spend. There are a thousand ways in which this can be discussed, but above all else, discussion will yield nothing if some action is not taken to secure desirable homeseekers and citizens for Oregon."

IRISH LEADER'S DAUGHTER SHOT

Sir Charles is a former high sheriff of county Limerick.

Mrs. W. R. Wyrick, of Pendleton, president of Pendleton council and district vice-president, was made state vice-president. District presidents chosen are: Mrs. Everett Charles, of Portland, No. 1; Mrs. J. E. Rand, Portland, No. 2; Mrs. Clara Porter Smith, of Pendleton, No. 3; Mrs. Evans, of Prineville, No. 4; Mrs. Bruce Kester, of Vale, No. 5; Mrs. H. T. Elmore, of Ashland, No. 6; Mrs. J. G. Swan, of Eugene, No. 7; Mrs. W. H. Hofning, of Corvallis, No. 8.

JOHN DAY ROAD IS FAVORED

COMMISSIONER YEON ENTHUSES OVER PROPOSED ROAD

Old Oregon Trail Declared Also to be an Important Traffic Artery To the East

PORTLAND, May 17.—Completion of the John Day highway and the Old Oregon trail is the desire of John B. Yeon state highway commissioner, who returned home yesterday from eastern and central Oregon.

"I come back more convinced than ever before that the main trunk roads should be built first," said he.

Prior to the time the commissioners made the trip—W. B. Barratt going all the way and R. A. Booth part of the journey—there was little enthusiasm among the officials to locate and push the John Day highway eastward of Prairie City. The Blue mountains present engineering difficulties and call for costly construction. Now, however, Mr. Yeon declared the John Day highway must be built. He said that eventually the natural road from the eastern edge of the state to Portland will be the John Day highway.

Highway Thought Important

"This highway," confessed Mr. Yeon, "is of greater importance than I had imagined before making this trip. The scenery is wonderful, the highway opens up an entire empire which now lacks transportation, and it is the shortest road to the east. There is a lot of fine grading already done on this highway and a good start has been made. The John Day highway will simply have to be completed."

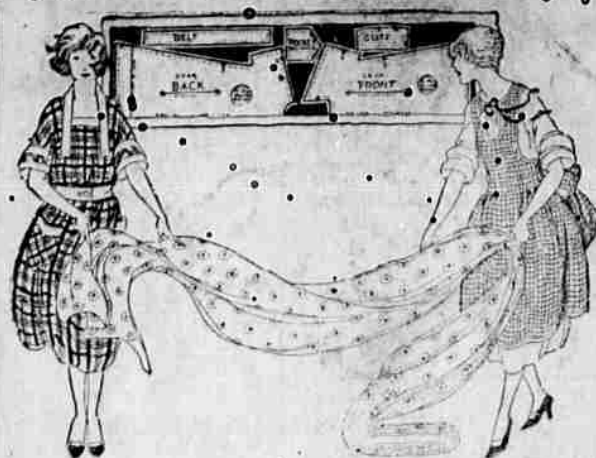
"Then there is the Old Oregon trail, from Ontario to Pendleton, where it connects with the Columbia river highway. This is a great traffic artery. Do you know that even now, in May, there have been 1500 people waiting for the snow to disappear from the gap in the Blue mountains near Cabbage hill, between La Grande and Pendleton, so they can go through? All along the Old Oregon trail the highway is under construction or under contract.

Portland to Benefit

"When these trunk lines are completed, the Old Oregon trail and the John Day Highway with the Pacific highway now open, and the Dallas-California under way, all leading to Portland—well, say, Portland's future will be immense. If taxpayers would only take a run around the state in a machine and see the roads which have been built and those under construction, they would never lick at the money spent on highways.

Boat Is Used

"We traveled by boat, on horseback and stage on the John Day highway. Contracts have been let for bridges, but the structures have not been completed. But when the highway is finished! "East of the Cascades the people
