State News Gleaned By Salem News Bureau

The state irrigation securities commission certified \$7000 bonds for the Kingman Colony drainage district near Nyssa.

Representatives of the Portland Association of Heating and Piping Contractors instead of continuing the Contractors and Dealers appeared before the state board of control with a plea that the state, in its building program, deal directly with these contractors instead of continuing the policy of allowing general building contractors to sublet contracts for plumbing, heating, electrical wiring, etc.

Satisfaction with the progress that is being made in all lines of vocational work in Oregon schools is expressed by H. H. Skidmore, a representative of the federal board of vocational education, who was in Oregon during the week on business connected with the department.

Oregon's total tax for this year is an increase of more than 20 per cent over last year, according to records in the office of the state tax commission. The total tax for this year is \$41,117,367.71, and the total for last year was \$32,596,695.03, a difference of \$8,520,672.68.

The state board of control at a meeting during the week formally accepted the new ladies' dormitory at the state school for the feeble minded. The building contains seventy beds. Its cost was \$56,000.

To get ideas relative to modern training schools for boys, Sam A. Koser, secretary of state; Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital for the insane, and W. C. Knighton, who is architect for the new training school plant to be built by this state, have been authorized to visit institutions in California, Colorado, Iowa, Indiana and Illinois.

SUN SPOTS CAUSE WIRE TROUBLES

NEW YORK, May 18.—Electrical influences exerted by the aurora borealis, or northern lights, believed to be caused by an unusually large sunspot or spots continued Sunday to play havoc with telegraph bureaus throughout the United States.

Beginning Friday night wire chiefs reported this phenomenon had injected extra voltage into their wires causing "earth currents" and interrupting traffic. The same conditions continued throughout Saturday and became increasingly intense Saturday night, causing one of the severest disturbances known in 30 years.

For about an hour before midnight Saturday, nearly every telegraph wire leading from New York and Chicago was out of condition. Ocean cables also were slightly affected. Curiously, however, the disturbance seemed to strengthen wireless signals. Intensity of the disturbance was lessened Sunday.
