She discussed special hospitals for children, soldiers and tubercular patients, and urged the students to visit them if they ever had the opportunity. Miss Zorn's talk was brief but very interesting.

were dismissed. Under the chairmanship of Miss Mildred Ridd, they had a very enjoyable picnic at the park.

Friday afternoon the associated Girl Students held an election of officers for the next school year. Beth Hesse was elected president of the association, Bertha Berger, vice-president, and Virginia Bryant secretary-treasurer.
