

EX-SERVICE MEN PLAN BIG SHOW

PORTLAND, May 24.—One of the greatest celebrations ever held in the city of Portland, will be staged on June 11th, the day following the Rose Festival, under the auspices of the American Legion. On that day, the ex-service men are to stage a monster "Head On" collision at the Portland Race Track. Two passenger type locomotives will be sent to destruction on a specially constructed track far out in the field but in full view of the grandstand. This stunt is conceded to be the most sensational spectacle ever witnessed.

Other attractions to fill out an entire afternoon's entertainment will be auto and motorcycle races, and a "Fat Man's Ford Race."

The program promises to be the most elaborate of its kind ever planned in Oregon, and arrangements are being made to take care of 50,000 people.

The funeral services were held at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Cross, on Wednesday. The American Legion, Woman's Relief Corps and the G. A. R. were present at the funeral. Charles William Cross was born at Milton, Oregon, September 29, 1894. At the age of 8 he moved with his parents to Union, Oregon. He was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles N. Cross. He worked for a number of years for the Eastern Oregon Meat Co. He was drafted into service at the beginning of the war on June 24, 1918. He enlisted at La Grande. He left Camp Lewis for overseas the 28th of August, 1918. He served in the trenches two weeks and went into the Evacuation Hospital No. 9, October 6, 1918. His disease was diagnosed as fever. He died October 10, 1918. He was a member of Company K, 308 Infantry G. 66 C. 92. He is survived by his parents, two brothers and three sisters. A half brother, Deltivan McGinnis, died July 20, 1920.

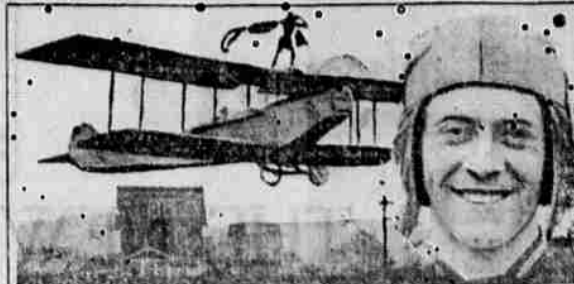

PORTLAND SEEKS FACTS ON FARM CROPS IN UNION

C. B. Miller, secretary of the Ad Club, has received a request from the Portland Chamber of Commerce, for information regarding the agricultural resources and production of Union county. The information is desired by the Portland organization for the purpose of making a survey of the agricultural products available for shipment via the Columbia River basin.

The specific information desired includes the amount of such products as wheat, wool, sheep, cattle, hogs and fruit, transportation facilities for moving crops, whether means for financing farmers exist and the plans or methods for movement of the crops desired. Information is also asked regarding whether or not crops are being moved via the Columbia River basin to the coast and if not, the reason for shipment to other sections.
