### No Crossing Permits

District Forest Inspector R. M. Evans of the Whitman National forest has notified the Umatilla forest office not to issue until further notice, any crossing permits for sheep which are to be trailed across from the Umatilla forest into the Whitman forest. This action is due to the late season and the unusually large amount of snow which still blocks the Whitman driveways, the ranges on that forest being later than usual. On the Wenaha division of the Umatilla forest practically all of the high north slopes and timbered areas are still covered with snow, varying in depth from one to six and even seven feet in depth.—Pendleton Tribune.

Difficulty is encountered because of having no properly located monuments to tie to, according to Mr. Garrett.

### DEMENTED MAN IS LODGED IN JAIL

John Doe was lodged in the city jail last night. John is about 45 years of age. He was taken into custody because of his mental condition. All night he heard people in the alley in the rear of the jail and people on the roof of the jail plotting to kill him.

Before being taken into the jail he held the same delusions and the persistence with which he clung to his fears of being assassinated led to his being held by the police. The delusion has such a grip on him that the iron doors and bars of the jail failed to give him a feeling of safety.

He will be turned over to the authorities for a hearing on his sanity.
