An announcement recently of the discovery by chemical warfare service of a liquid poison so strong that three drops will kill anyone whose skin it touches has brought a protest from A. Francis Phillips, a prominent Chicago chemist. Correspondence made public by Phillips indicates that he had offered the government just such a poison in August, 1917, and was the first man to suggest the use of airplanes to distribute "liquid death."

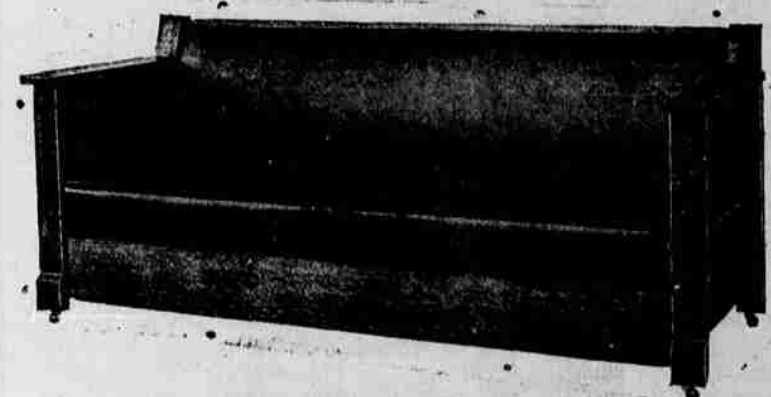
