JUNE 7 SPECIAL ELECTION DAY

SIX MEASURES ON BALLOT IN UNION COUNTY

Soldier Aid Bill, Union County Salary Bill, Lengthening of Legislature's Session, Among the Measures.

On Tuesday, June 7, a special election will be held in Union county to determine the will of the voters on five measures, three of them amendments to the constitution, and on the Union county salary bill, which proposes to increase the salaries being paid county officials in Union county now.

The measures are: Constitutional amendment creating a world war veterans' state fund. Constitutional amendment lengthening the duration of the state legislature and increasing the pay of members. Constitutional amendment enabling the governor to veto the emergency clause on legislative measures. Hygienic marriage examination and license bill. Measure qualifying women to sit as jurors.

The purpose of the world war veterans state aid fund amendment is to issue bonds in the state not to exceed three per cent of the assessed valuation of all property in the state to raise money to be loaned in amounts of not more than \$4,000 or paid as a bonus of \$15 for each month of service, but not to exceed \$500 to Oregon ex-service men.

The measure lengthening duration of the legislature amends Section 29, Article 4, of the constitution. It increases the length of the session from forty to sixty days, increases the pay of members from \$3 to \$5 a day, both for regular and special sessions and places a limit on the period in which bills may be introduced.

The object of the marriage examination and license bill is declared to be to stop propagation of feeble-minded persons or those otherwise likely to suffer by inheritance. It provides that both male and female applicants for marriage licenses shall submit to examination by competent physicians to ascertain if they are afflicted with contagious or communicable disease or whether they are normal mentally. If both or either fail to pass the examination the measure would prohibit their marriage unless one or both were sterilized.

The woman jurors bill is a revision of the jury law providing that women are qualified to sit as jurors.

The Union county salary bill will, if passed, increase the salaries of the county judge, the county treasurer, the county assessor, the sheriff, the county school superintendent and the county clerk. The county judge will, if the bill is passed, be required to devote all of his time to the work of his office. Provisions are also made for the necessary traveling expenses incurred by the school superintendent and the sheriff and his deputies.

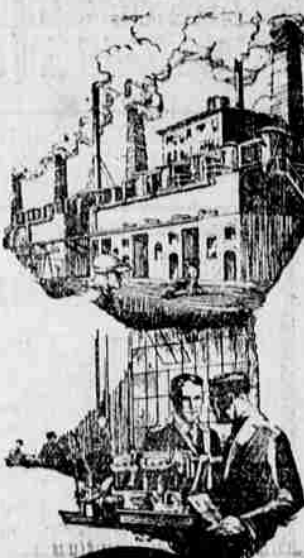
