PUMPING PLANT IS IN OPERATION

BAKER, June 2.—The finest pumping plant in the Northwest, excepting none, not even the plants supplying Portland Heights, has just begun operation in Eastern Oregon, supplying the Slide Irrigation district with water for the first time, stated H. W. (Bill) Hatfield, who was in Baker recently making a final inspection of the plant. This new irrigation section is located in Malheur county across the Snake river from Weiser, Idaho. It covers about 2000 acres of dry bench land and serves at present 22 ranches. The new route of the Old Oregon Trail will be cut, through the heart of this district.

The Slide Irrigation district is organized under the irrigation district law of Oregon and issued 100,000 bonds to finance the project. The pumping plant consists of 400 horse power direct connected electric motor and centrifugal pumps, that raise water for a total lift of 70 feet, through 36 inch creosoted wood stave pipe to the point of distribution over the project lands.

State News

Rev. G. L. Clark delivered the baccalaureate address at Pendleton Sunday evening for the graduating class. Graduation exercises will be held Friday evening.

James H. Aldrich, 25 years a resident of Portland, and aged 72 years, died Tuesday. He served in the Union army, and later, when he came to Oregon, ran the newspaper at Newport.

Harold Hatten, aged 16, of Pendleton, broke the northwest amateur record in the 50-yard and established a new 100-yard record in the swimming meet in Seattle last week. Hatten represented the Multnomah club of Portland, and his time was 28 1/5 seconds for the 50-yard and 1:03 minutes, two-fifths seconds in the 100 yard.

Huge signboards giving information to tourists concerning the population and the resources of this county may be a plan adopted by Umatilla county as an advertising feature. The idea has been conceived by Judge I. M. Schanper of the county court.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of the commencement of the class of 1896 will be celebrated by members of that class during commencement at the University of Oregon this year. Virgil Johnson, general secretary of the National Association of Travelers' Aid societies, with headquarters in New York, and a member of the class of 96, will deliver the baccalaureate address Sunday morning, June 19.

Twenty-eight years ago W. J. Curran, of Oregon City, lost a plain gold ring, a keepsake, bearing the initials "W. J. C." inscribed on the inside. It was while working among the flower bed at her home at Mountain View addition to that city a few days ago that Mrs. F. M. Darling found the ring.

The summer term of the University of Oregon which is expected the largest enrollment in its history, will begin June 22 and end July 30.

On the twentieth of June, 104 students will be graduated from the University of Oregon. This is the largest of 43 graduating classes turned out by the University.

Herbert Gordon of Portland has been appointed regent of the University of Oregon to succeed Lloyd L. Mullit, who has resigned to take a position with a San Francisco bank.

Dr. and Mrs. David Clinton Kellem, for the last 22 years faculty members of the Eugene Bible university, have left for a 15 months' trip that will take them to many parts of the United States, the Holy Land and Asia. Dr. Kellem, who has a year's leave of absence, plans to circumnavigate the globe. After a visit in the Holy Land they will visit India, China, Japan, the Philippine islands and Hawaii en route home.

The Douglas fir tree is not a fir at all, but is a hemlock, and a false hemlock at that, according to Professor John A. Lee in a lecture at the Salem public library on "The Cone Bearing Trees of Oregon." The true fir, says Professor Lee, has the cone growing upright and the cone sheds its seeds before it falls. On the so-called Douglas fir the cone hangs downward.
