serve. He took the stand that if women were to stand alongside of men in state and national affairs, they should be forced to serve and be therefore disappointed of the present bill on that subject before the people.

Eberhard Favors Legislative Term

Senator Colon R. Eberhard spoke in favor of the bill extending the legislative term and raising the salaries of legislators. He contended there is not sufficient time to consider matters of importance, such as appropriations and viewed it as a matter of economy for the time to be extended. He favored the bill permitting the governor to veto emergency clauses in bills without impairing the remainder of the bill, although the senator stated that he was originally opposed to the measure and voted against it at the session. After consideration he expressed the belief that it is a good bill. His attitude on women serving as jurors was antagonistic because it takes away the taxpayer qualification of jurors and permits any voter of proper age to serve in that important capacity.

Dr. Mayville Speaks

Bitter opposition to the bill providing for restricted marriages and sterilization in certain instances was expressed by Dr. Mayville. He contended such a law was going to far and placing power to determine mentality of people in the hands of a board was a most dangerous procedure.

Roy Currey, commander of the American Legion Post, presided at last night's meeting and after adjourning the different committees arranged for an active campaign in favor of the soldiers' bill from now until election day.

W. T. TILDEN IS TENNIS CHAMP

WINS WORLD'S HARD COURT TENNIS HONOR TODAY

U. S. Student of Tennis Has Been Playing Since 1900 and Has Won Several Titles

ST. CLOUD, France, June 4.—William T. Tilden, grass court tennis champion, of Philadelphia, won the world's hard court tennis single championship today.

William T. Tilden, 2nd, World's Champion lawn tennis player, was born in Germantown, Pa., February 10, 1893. He was a student at the Germantown Academy and graduated from the University of Pennsylvania. He began playing tennis in 1900 and won his first singles and doubles junior tournament the following year at Germantown. He is tall and slim, standing six feet one inch and weighing about 155 pounds.

Tilden won several titles, holding the Philadelphia championship from 1914 to 1917 and was the leading player in many tournaments but his first national honors were won in 1913 when he and Miss Mary Brown, of California, took the United States national mixed doubles championship and repeated the following year.

Tilden was the National Clay Court Champion of 1918. In 1919 Vincent Edwards, the young player from Yonkers, N. Y., defeated Tilden in the final for the national indoor championship singles but Tilden reversed this by beating Edwards in the final round for the 1920 indoor title. Tilden and Edwards contended the other outdoors in the 1919 and 1920 national indoor doubles and the Philadelphia's splendid work in winning the world's championship at Wimbledon, England, the United States National Championship and in the last Davis Cup series is too fresh to the minds of tennis enthusiasts to need any comment.

Tilden is probably the most versatile tennis player of recent years, combining all forms of strokes and court strategy in his game. He possesses a terrific service, control of cut and twist and varies his strokes so rapidly that an opponent never knows whether to expect a powerfully topped drive or a puzzling underhand chop. His great height and reach are helpful factors in remarkable court covering. While several players, who have specialized in certain strokes, may exceed him in the brilliant execution of those, none exceeds the World's Champion in the high standard of all-round play and striking.
