vehicles without electric tail and lights. Driving over a fire hose is also an offense.

Vehicles must not be left on cross walks or within ten feet of a fire hydrant or a S. S. stall box.

Twelve feet from the curb is the limit of space allowed to be occupied by parked vehicles between 8 in the morning and 6 at night.

Drivers slowing down, stopping or turning are required to give timely signals by outstretched arm.

Whenever an authorized officer signals for a driver to stop or take a direction or otherwise proceed for the safety of the public the driver must obey the orders of the officer. The officer is required by ordinance, in such cases, to "conspicuously display his star" before making the signal.

Brakes must be in proper working order. No vehicles shall be left standing on any street for displaying it for sale or exchange. No vehicle shall be parked where it will obstruct traffic. Motors in standing vehicles must be at a standstill when without a driver. Offenses, exhausts and mufflers must be kept closed. Five tons is the limit of loads allowed on city streets.

Pedestrians shall cross all streets in the congested district only at regular crossings and at right angles. They shall observe the signals and directions of traffic officers wherever stationed.

A vehicle, approaching an intersection of streets, roads or highways with the intention of turning thereat shall, when turning to the right, keep clearly to the right, and when turning to the left, shall run to and beyond the center of the intersection at which such turn is made.
