## CIRCUIT COURT OPENED MONDAY

BANKRUPT ESTATE SUES WIDOW MAN ON FURNITURE.

Two-Day Recess Before Court Commences Again—Calendar for Term Is Slim—Grand Jury Works.

The June term of circuit court opened yesterday morning. The entire day was occupied with the case of Hal Bohlenkamp, trustee for the bankrupt estate of W. H. Schwabke, vs. Stella Birney. The case is being tried before a jury. The suit is over some furniture alleged to have been removed by the defendant from deceased's home, the defendant claiming that the furniture came into her possession legally.

The plaintiff occupied nearly the entire day in presenting his case. R. J. Green is attorney for defendant and John S. Hodgkin for plaintiff.

Today is a judicial holiday and as the stock show begins tomorrow no other cases have been set until Friday. On that day, according to the court calendar, the case of the Western Bond and Mortgage company vs. E. E. Carpenter is scheduled. Crawford and Eakin are attorneys for plaintiff and Cochran and Eberhard are attorneys for the defendant.

## FISHER FUNERAL HELD SUNDAY

HAD BEEN MELANCHOLY FOR SEVERAL MONTHS.

Set Fire to Straw Stacks, Then Climbed on Top and Shot Self With 22 Calibre Rifle.

BARNES, June 7.—The funeral of Benjamin Fisher, prominent farmer of Baker county and owner of Fisher Hot Springs, who committed suicide early Saturday morning, was held here Sunday morning.

Mr. Fisher shot himself with a 22-caliber rifle after climbing on top of a stack of hay and setting a fire in a back field from the house.

For a long time Mr. Fisher had been in poor health and

said that he might become deranged at any time and he was watched as vigilantly as possible by the members of his family, fearing that he might attempt self destruction.

An early fever all his life, Mr. Fisher arose Saturday morning and went up to the bath house. He was unwell shortly after, and the absence of a 22-caliber rifle from its place where Mrs. Fisher had hidden it. This alarmed the wife and she telephoned to her brother, B. R. Angell. A search was made immediately. Two stacks of hay were observed on fire and on arriving there the searchers found the dead body of Mr. Fisher in time to prevent its incineration.

The age of suicide was considered between 5 and 6 o'clock and it was not until 8 that the body was found.

Mr. Fisher is survived by his wife and two children, Mrs. Helen Osborne, of Joseph, Mo.; Mrs. Bertha Bonham, Danbar, Conn.; Glenn Fisher, aged 21, residing at home; Freda Fisher, aged 19. He also has two brothers and two sisters: John K. Fisher, Muddy Creek; Will Fisher, McEwen; Mrs. Martha Scholl and Mrs. Anna Vandervall both of Baker.

After a trip to the Fisher home, coroner West decided no inquest was necessary.

## U. S. WANTED CASE DISMISSED

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The government has asked the supreme court to dismiss its appeal in the anti-trust suit against the American Can company and its subsidiaries.
