W. B. Pickens received 200 more little feathered aristocrats last week by express from the Queen Hatchery at Seattle.

Mr. Pickens is a prominent member of the Eastern Oregon Poultry Association and is building up quite a poultry plant on Oak Street on the lots he purchased recently from H. L. Combs.

He is making a specialty of the single comb White Leghorns, Tanned Trappes and other breeds. La Grande is becoming recognized as an ideal place for poultry culture on account of its dry mild climate and good shipping facilities.

Some who have been contemplating starting on the business have been deterred on account of the low price of eggs at the present time, but according to Jay Todd, the baby chick king of Seattle, the soft wet spring has made the hatch sub-normal this year and there will not be an over supply of layers.

It is the desire of the poultry associations to have a fair price for eggs the year around, neither too high in winter nor too low in summer.
