COMMANDER OF LEGION PLEASED
GRATIFIED BY THE STAND OF VOTERS ON AID BILL.
See Much Benefit to State in Opportunities Opened to Service Men of Oregon.

PRINTING HOUSE CHANGES HANDS

A. W. NELSON SELLS PLANT TO F. E. STILLWELL.

New Concern Will Remain in Same Location and Will Be Called Stillwell Printing House.

F. E. Stillwell has purchased the Nelson Printing Company and hereafter this book and job printing establishment will be known as the Stillwell Printing House.

The Nelson Printing company was the outgrowth of the old Observer book and job plant, and was renovated and rebuilt by A. W. Nelson. The change was made at the time when the Observer moved from its old building on Sixth street to its present quarters on Adams avenue. Mr. Nelson moving his plant to its present location under the Coolidge Paint Store.

Mr. Stillwell was formerly in the printing business in the east, before coming to La Grande. He has taken immediate possession, and the establishment now goes under its new name of the Stillwell Printing House.

J. E. REYNOLDS IS HIGH MAN

ELECTED DIRECTOR OF GRAIN ASSOCIATION.

Two Tie for Second Place in Election Held Yesterday—Will Serve for One Year.

J. E. Reynolds, of La Grande, was high man in the Oregon Co-operative Grain Growers' directors election yesterday. Reynolds led with 115 votes and H. B. Davidhizer, of Joseph, and A. V. Swift, of Baker, tied for second place with ninety-nine each, while F. W. Eppinger, of Baker, received 46 votes.

The directors were elected to represent District No. 1 of the association, which includes the counties of Wallawa, Union, Baker and Malheur. Two men will serve from this district. This morning no announcement had been made as to how the tie vote will be settled.

The men who were on the ballot yesterday were nominated May 24. The term of office is from June 17, 1921, to June 16, 1922. The voting yesterday was light. Approximately 50 per cent of the membership voted. A. V. Swift was in charge of the election, which was held in the city hall here.

BALL GAME HERE FRIDAY EVENING

The members of the Chaffee Athletics baseball team arrived in the city this morning, and are spending the day in preparation for their game with the La Grande team here tomorrow afternoon at the ball park. The game will be a highly interesting one and will probably be called about 5 o'clock.

The Chaffee Athletics are from Pocatello, Idaho, and are on a "barnstorming" tour of the northwest. Thus far, they have played seventeen games, and have only three defeats to their discredit, having lost to Boise, Caldwell and Ontario. They played with the Baker team this week.

ROOMING HOUSE MAN ARRESTED

Jack Labine, proprietor of the Elite rooming house located at Chestnut and Jefferson, and four pints of moonshine whiskey were captured in a raid last night in which all members of the police department took part. The raid came off at eight o'clock.

WEEKLY REPORT OF CITY MANAGER FOR WEEK ENDING JUNE 4

The weekly report of the city manager for the week ending June 4, shows that a total of \$2546.32 collected by the city treasurer's office. Water rental contributed \$1223.41 to this amount. The disbursements from the treasurer's office amounted to \$2152.79. The police department contributed \$120 in fines and \$4 in pound fees to the city's bank account.

The recorder's office issued 43 warrants in the sum of \$3116.23. Seven building permits, three rooming house licenses and one each of the following licenses were issued by the recorder during the week: Peddler, taxi, plumbing, hotel, pool hall, dance hall.

The engineering department was busy setting stakes for street and sidewalk improvements.
