TWO LOCAL CASES AFFIRMED

SALEM, June 9.—The supreme court has affirmed the Union county case of the state against Ed Stillwell, and has also affirmed the Union county case of F. Stillwell, appellant, against George McDonald and others.

The following is a summary of the opinions handed down in these two cases:

State vs. F. E. Stillwell, appellant; appeal from Union county; appeal from order setting aside defendant's motion to dismiss indictment against him for alleged failure to bring case to trial. Opinion by Justice McBride. Judge Delton Biggs affirmed.

F. E. Stillwell, appellant, vs. George McDonald, et al.; appeal from Union county; unsuccessful replevin action to recover cattle held for grazing fees, under contract permitting removal by owner, after McDonald had removed same; opinion by Chief Justice Burnett. Judge J. W. Knowles affirmed.

NOMINATIONS ARE CONFIRMED

WASHINGTON, June 9.—The senate has confirmed all of the shipping board nominations, which included: Meyer Lissner, of Los Angeles; T. V. O'Connor, of Buffalo, N. Y.; Edward C. Plummer, of Maine, both republicans, and Admiral Benson, ex-Senator George Chamberlain of Oregon and Frederick I. Thompson of Mobile, Ala., Democrats.

The senate has ordered an investigation of the London speech of Rear Admiral Sims, on the Irish sympathizers. The senate also ordered an investigation of all government agencies dealing with former service men.

Sims Stands By Words.
LONDON, June 9.—Rear Admiral Sims is quoted as saying that he stands by every word of the speech that he delivered on the Irish question, on Tuesday.
