

LAKE ANGLERS OVERSTEP LAW

According to reports reaching here, fishing through the ice at Anderson lake is resulting in many catches which are reported to be greatly in excess of the thirty pounds allowed by law.

According to the reports, which were brought down by some fishermen who have been whipping the streams below the lake, men are coming down from the lake, which is frozen over, with pack horses laden with some of the biggest trout ever seen in that section. Half a dozen of the smallest would make the limit catch but the men who are getting the fish are said to be taking them out in large quantities.

Those claiming to be wise to the ways of the fish in the lake say that the excessive catches are made by night. When a hole is cut in the ice during the daytime, the fish can see the anglers and their natural shyness keeps them away from the hole where the bait awaits them. At night, by building a fire near the hole to attract the fish, they are easily trapped into sampling the bait of the anglers.
