CONTRACTS ARE PROGRESSING

GRAIN GROWERS SIGN UP 4,163,431 BUSHELS.

Delegates Recently Elected Are to Meet in The Dalles Thursday to Name Directors.

THE DALLES, June 13.—The Oregon Co-operative Grain Growers' association now has 1,458 contracts signed with wheat growers in the state, calling for the marketing of a grand total of 4,163,431 bushels of wheat by the association during the coming year, it has been announced by Edgar L. Ludwick, organization manager, whose headquarters are in this city.

Of this total, 127 contracts are signed with Wasco county farmers, calling for the co-operative marketing of 311,500 bushels of wheat. Among the other counties of the state which have a large number of association members are Washington, Jefferson, Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Wallowa, Union and Baker counties.

Election of delegates has been going on in the various districts covered by the association at the present time. A check of the vote completed revealed the following result: District 1—Barnes, Mathew, Baker, Union and Wallowa counties; E. B. Davidhizer of Joseph and J. E. Reynolds of La Grande. District 2—Results not checked. District 3—Morrow county: Howard Anderson of Heppner and Herbert Olden and H. V. Smouse of Ine. District 4—Gilliam, Wheeler and Grant counties: C. A. Edwards, and J. W. Dyer, both of Mayville. District 5—Sherman county: V. H. Smith of Wasco, William Powell of Moro, and Fred Krurow of Grass Valley. District 6—Wasco, Hood River, Jefferson, Crook and Deschutes counties: C. A. Harth and Roy Bolton, both of The Dalles. District 7—Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington and Columbia counties: George H. Brown of New Era.

All of the delegates elected will meet in The Dalles Thursday, June 17, when they will name directors from their number, to serve for one year.

PEARSON FLIES IN GRAND CANYON

WILLIAMS, Ariz., June 13.—Lt. Alexander Pearson, army flier, Sunday flew into the Grand canyon and landed and took off again at an altitude of more than 3000 feet. He said he believed this was the first time either feat had been accomplished.

Lt. Pearson has been ordered by the war department to fly over the canyon to study its air currents for the department of the interior and to locate possible landing fields.

CREST OF FLOOD IN PORTLAND HAS BEEN REACHED

PORTLAND, June 12.—Unless there is another hot spell, causing a further rise in the rivers, the crest of the flood has been reached here. The Upper Columbia and the Snake are dropping, the Willamette is stationary, and a slow drop has been forecast for the next three days.
