of less cost, less work and the further fact that the present route would take tourists through the most unsightly parts of Imbler—the highway missing the business district and the prettier parts entirely.

L. A. Bingham cited the fact that where the state wants to put the road is just where Imbler's future warehouses must stand and to build it there will retard Imbler's growth.

Clay Fox pointed to the fact that during the fall of the year a dozen box cars are frequently on the siding at one time, and four-horse teams with trailers cross the track where the present survey runs every five minutes of the day, and if the highway parallels the warehouses, there will be congestion on the highway for several months of the year at that point. After others had spoken, Attorney H. E. Dixon, of this city, called attention to the fact that those who pay for highways should have consideration along with the transcontinental traveler, that Oregon people are paying for Oregon roads and should be given some voice in location of such roads, and moved that the Ad Club join forces with Imbler to bring about the desired end. The motion carried with a whoop.

Albert Hunter made a speech in favor of the Thief Valley Irrigation Project, noting that its development would benefit the Eastern part of Union county and a motion was adopted pledging the club to assist the Baker-Commercial club in its efforts to complete that great project.

Among the guests present at the meeting aside from the enthusiastic Imbler delegation, were Attorney Vesile, of Vesile & Vesile, Portland attorneys, and Attorney Fred Stewer, of Pendleton. Both spoke briefly, the former noting La Grande to be "the prettiest spot in Oregon," or words to that effect. The Pendletonian voiced his approval of Imbler's contention. To pass through the alley and under the main streets of a city is to destroy much of the value of the highways, he contended. The singing of songs was another part of the program today that pleased the visitors.

**DRINK MILK IS
NURSE'S PLEA**

Miss Louise Zorn, county health nurse, in her monthly report just issued, tells how the children of the Greenwood school have been benefited since the last weighing, by the drinking of plenty of good, rich milk. Her report for May is as follows:

"It cannot be impressed too strongly," says Miss Horn, "on the minds of the parents that growing children must have milk. Frail little bodies can be made strong by drinking much good, sweet milk. The good health of our future manhood and womanhood depends on the health of the children of today. What better birthright could be given a child than the birthright of good health."

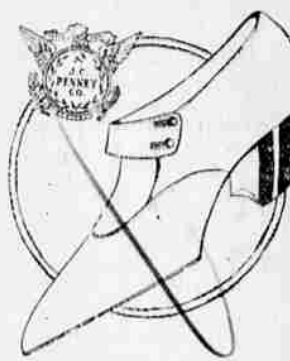
