tion as a self supporting community. Red Cross is in charge.

"Upon the invitation of the governor of Colorado and the city of Pueblo, the American Red Cross has undertaken the task of rehabilitation and is in charge of all relief work. Destitute families are now being taken care of in refugee camps and thousands are being fed at field kitchens, maintained under a Red Cross direction. Initial steps to rehabilitate these unfortunate persons has been started, so that they may again become productive citizens and not continue objects of charity. Homes must be built and productivity restored, with the principle always adhered to of making each sufferer help himself as far as he is able. This will necessitate funds being made available immediately. The Red Cross has appropriated \$105,000 to the relief funds, but general subscriptions reported to date have been light.

"May we, the undersigned, urge the need of haste on the part of those who can assist, expressing our deep gratefulness for the assistance that may be given.

Lineman Drops Twenty Feet—Is Badly Bruised

W. M. Anderson, a lineman in the employ of the Pacific States Telephone company, was brought to La Grande yesterday evening suffering from painful but not serious injuries sustained when he fell about 20 feet from a tree.

Anderson was working about six miles above Hilgard when the accident happened. According to reports reaching here he was sawing a limb

from the tree and his saw struck the strap which was holding him to the tree, causing it to break.

Examination at the local hospital showed that while Anderson was severely bruised his bones were broken and there is little likelihood of serious results arising from the injuries.

The injured man was brought to La Grande from Hilgard in an ambulance sent up from here.

PORTLAND, June 15.—Mrs. Louis Agee, widow of Harry Agee, and J. H. Klecker, music teacher have been ordered held as material witnesses in the alleged murder of Agee, who was stabbed at his home Friday night. Warrants charging first degree murder, naming "John Doe" have been issued. Agee's throat was slashed, the first theory being that burglars had committed the deed, but the police later questioned this.
