How Dempsey and Georges Size Up

NEW YORK, June 17.—Fair-minded critics are withholding judgment in sizing up relative merits of Dempsey and Carpenter.

Those who have seen both men are loath to compare them because the Frenchman is considered under the disadvantage of having just arrived from a sea voyage while Dempsey has had the benefit of a month on Freddy Welsh's farm and a couple of weeks at Atlantic City. The truth is that there was a certain amount of disappointment when Carpenter stepped off the boat.

There isn't much of the usual talk one hears before a championship bout—that they are ready to go into the ring right now.

But right now it is generally conceded Dempsey is in much better physical shape than Carpenter.

Carpenter's decision to do his training in secret is unpopular. Dempsey rosters complain that Carpenter will have the edge if he continues this policy, inasmuch as Dempsey's methods will be public property, while his will be secret.

The two questions fight experts are discussing after taking a look at both men is the age element and whether Carpenter can stand punishment.

Dempsey is 25; Carpenter is 27. But the Frenchman looks older than that. There is not nearly so much of the boyishness in his face as in Dempsey's. He looks nearer 35 than 27, probably because he has been fighting much longer.

Dempsey is training down from 200 pounds to 185, the figure at which he will enter the ring. Carpenter weighs a trifle less, but he looks much lighter than he really is. He certainly doesn't look as if he has Dempsey's stamina.

There have been many reports that Dempsey is worrying more about this fight than any other—that he actually fears Carpenter. Maybe he does. But one of the first things noticed about Carpenter when he arrived was that he looked rather drawn and nervous.

For several days Dempsey has been taking on three sparring partners a day for three rounds each.

There is much surprise expressed here at Francois Descamps' announcement that Georges will not do regular boxing until two weeks before the fight. He will go on the road daily and indulge in gymnastics.

Maybe Descamps knows more about training Carpenter than anybody else—but volunteer advisers believe he will make a mistake if he does not do more real boxing before he steps into the ring.

PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL EXPECTS TO SECURE SPECIMENS

E. D. Towler, principal of the La Grande high school, left yesterday morning for the biological station of the University of Washington at Friday Harbor, Wash., to spend the summer months in teaching and doing research work in animal ecology.

Mr. Towler expects to return early in August to look after the work preliminary to the opening of the school here. He expects to bring back with him a large amount of material to

be used in the science classes of the high school, especially animals to be used in the biology classes. Mr. Towler spent last summer at the biological station on Friday Harbor and he declares that that region is a good one for obtaining specimens for study.

On returning he expects to stop at the University of Washington in Seattle as well as at a number of high schools to "talk shop" with the pedagogues there and get ideas that will aid him in keeping the standard

of the local high school at the high place it now holds.

Cement for Glass.

For mending valuable glass objects which would be insured by common cement, chrome cement may be used. This is a mixture of five parts of gelatin to one of a solution of acid chromate of lime. The broken edges are covered with this pressed together and exposed to sunlight, the effect of the latter being to render the compound insoluble even in boiling water.
