ROAD CONDITIONS IN EASTERN OREGON

From Boardman in Morrow county to 15 miles east of Pendleton in Umatilla county, excellent gravelled roads; the county bridge at Umatilla, over the Umatilla river, is closed to traffic on account of high water; necessary to take ferry at this point.

From the end of the gravelled road to Kamela, take the old road, which is very rough but can be traveled. From Kamela to Hilgard road is passable.

From Hilgard to La Grande under construction—road very rough.

From La Grande to Hot Lake excellent paved and macadamized road.

From Hot Lake to Union—follow detour road along foot hills, a dirt road in fair condition, very dusty.

Valley roads between Hot Lake and Union still under water, passable to team traffic with light loads.

Under construction—very rough.

Union to Telocaset, earth road in good condition.

Telocaset to North Powder—roads good.

North Powder to Haines—road is fair. There are several miles of unpaved gravel, and also a number of box culverts are under construction, at which there are short detours.

From Haines to Baker—excellent gravelled road.

From Baker to Nelson—county road in fair condition.

From Nelson to Huntington under construction; several detours well marked; detour roads rough with steep hills.

From Huntington to Weiser—take ferry at Onda, via Weiser and Payette.

First 7 miles rough, balance good. No night service at Onda ferry at present on account of high water.

From Weiser to Ontario—under construction, very rough.

Keep Idaho side to Ontario.

From Ontario south to Nyssa good.

From Ontario to Vale—road fair.

From Vale to Ironside very good.

From Vale to Burns very rough; badly rutted and washed by recent rains; from Vale out 25 miles fairly good; from this point to Crane very bad; no signs and many forks. Detour from Junction to Lanesboro.

From Baker to Unity heavy rains during the month a handicap to travel.

From Baker to Halfway—first ten miles macadamized—balance only fair.

La Grande-Joseph—

From La Grande to Island City—paved.

Island City to Rhinehart—very dusty and rough.

From Rhinehart to Elgin, over hill, very rough. From Elgin to Wallawa hill—very good.

From Wallawa hill, through Wallawa Canyon to Rock creek, very rough, almost impassable. Take South hill detour, well marked. This detour has steep grades, sharp curves, and requires very careful driving.

From Wallawa Canyon to Enterprise, road is generally good, rough in places.

From head of Wallawa Canyon to Wallawa, take road to left at canyon and follow hill road to Wallawa; bridges out on other routes.

From Wallawa to Lostine and Evans, take hill road at Wallawa to east of Miles bridge—drive slow across new construction at bridge—detour to left east of bridge via Evans to get to Lostine and Enterprise.

From Lostine to Evans, take Wade Gulch and Trout creek hill road; valley road not passable.

From Enterprise to Joseph some what rough at present; county forces working and dragging road to put it in best shape possible for summer travel. Route detours south on river.

St. Joseph 1 mile, turn east on river road, cross railroad track; south on east side of track 2 miles; turn west across track 1 mile; south 1 1/2 miles; east across track 2 miles to Joseph; south through Joseph 2 miles to Wallawa Lake. This routing will be used all through the summer. Sufficient signs will be placed to follow the road with ease. There is no construction work to contend with.

From Pendleton to Washington state line, paved with the exception of a stretch of about 2 miles between Weston to foot of Dry Creek hill. Rough detour road, well marked. This stretch will be open to traffic about July first.

From Pendleton to Pilot Rock, from McKay Creek bridge road is in good condition except the Poor Farm grade which is very rough; for the next five miles is in very good condition; from this point to Pilot Rock road is very dusty and rough; construction is under way through this section at the present time. The worst features of this route can be avoided by taking detour along east side of Birch creek.

From Pendleton to Heppner—This road is in better condition than it has been for a number of years; there are a number of very rocky stretches.

From Heppner to Gilliam county line the road is very rough with the exception of the 4-mile stretch which has been recently macadamized near the Gilliam county line.

The betrayal of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, occurred on the evening following Thursday, 14th Nisan, April 6, A. D. 30, at 10 or 11 p. m. or, according to others, soon after midnight. The Crucifixion was about 9 a. m. on Friday, 15th Nisan, April 7, A. D. 30. The Resurrection was "as the day began to dawn," on Sunday, 17th Nisan, April 9, A. D. 30. The ascension took place on Thursday, May 18, A. D. 30, or A. U. C., that is, year of Rome 784.
