

WILL TAKE TRIP OVER CONTINENT

MR. AND MRS. H. C. TRULL OF SHERRYS TO LEAVE.

Will Visit Playgrounds of Youth in Maine, During Early Automobile Tour.

All the way across the continent, equipped to camp and sleep wherever they get the notion to do so, with side trips to many historic meadows of the eastern states, is the trip upon which Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Trull leave the middle of this week. The Sherrys theatre owners have assigned the business affairs of the movie house to competent understudies and they are off for about three months of unalloyed amusement.

Mr. Trull has not seen the playgrounds of his boyhood day in Maine in 43 years—Mrs. Trull has never been there, hence more than ordinary interest attached to the trip for both of them.

The equipment which they take with them includes, first of all, a trusty Studebaker, provided with sleeping equipment in the tonneau. In addition, Mrs. Trull has rigged up a special tent which attached to the side of the car with three stakes and sufficient rope to withstand a windstorm, in and under those circumstances they expect to live when halted.

At Ogden they hit the Lincoln highway and on reaching Chicago expect to stop over for a week, visiting the theatres of the big metropolis. Then, at about the region of Cleveland, they will branch up to Albany, N. Y., where they will leave their car and go down the Hudson river in steamboat and talk about the Great White Way, seeing the theatres and other sights for a week. After returning to their car at Albany they drive to Boston and then take boat for Maine points, visiting the historic scenes and the early home of Mr. Trull.

Their return, at present, is mapped out to include the southern route, crossing the lower fringe of the States into California and then home again.

"We are in no hurry, refuse to try for records, but travel when we please, and loaf and fish when we please," said Mr. Trull today in speaking of his trip.

That they will have many a delightful tale to tell on their return goes without saying.
