

KILBANE TELLS HOW DIFFERENCE IN FOOTWORK MAY DECIDE BIG GO

By JOHNNY KILBANE, Featherweight Champion. A fighter who misses a blow should always be in such position that he is ready to deliver another. To be in such shape, he must always have one foot flat on the ground. That's where a surprise may come in the battle between Dempsey and Carpenter at Jersey on July 2. For Monsieur Georges is not the type of fighter at all who believes in anchoring his feet anywhere in particular, least of all on the floor of a ring. Rather the Frenchman is always in the air, balanced on the tips of his toes, as the accompanying photograph shows. The drawings of Georges' flying feet were made from action photographs of the fighting Frenchman. On the other hand Champion Jack is the type of fighter who keeps himself always set. He has a wicked gallop, but it isn't necessary for him to go up on both toes to send it over. His ability to follow up one blow with another is demonstrated by his one-two punch that laid away Willard.

There isn't any doubt but what Carpenter gets plenty of speed into his jabs and hooks with this "toe-hold" system, but let me say this: Should Jack duck one of Carpenter's blows and should the Frenchman's arm slip over the champion's shoulder, while he's balanced on his toes, nothing in the world would keep him from tipping over forward after it. I don't mean just that, either, for there is ONE thing. That's Dempsey's fist. A right or left to the jaw which he would be very likely to collide with, would topple the Frenchman in the opposite direction. For Georges, in going up on his toes, throws himself dangerously open to an opponent who is quick enough to catch him during the seconds he is off balance. He'll find Dempsey a clever enough boxer to take advantage of just such an opening, too. Carpenter figures he adds steam to his punches by going up on his toes when he sends them over. It's true that all punches that have any real power are delivered from the toe-

RUMOR SAYS RAIL ROAD MAY BUILD

VALE, June 23.—Persistent rumors are again prevalent throughout southeastern Oregon that the Oregon Short Line railroad is again seriously considering the extension of its Ontario-Crane branch on west to connect with Bend and thereby give the interior of the state a outlet to the west. One railroad man, a construction man doing repairs on the road west of Vale, said this week that he believed actual work on the extension would commence within a few months. The extension of the Oregon Short Line branch to Bend, or some point with railroad service to the west, is something that the people of South-eastern Oregon have worked for for years.

REPORT FOREST FIRES

Mail Carriers on Rural Routes Will Hereafter do Much in Keeping Down Fire Losses. PORTLAND, Ore., June 23.—Rural and star route mail carriers of the postoffice department will hereafter report forest fires to forest rangers, according to a copy of an order of the postmaster general just received at the U. S. forest service offices here. Mail carriers often have an opportunity of rendering valuable co-operation in fire protection by early discovery of forest fires along their routes and reporting them to forest rangers, thereby helping protect the forest resources of the northwest, say forest officials. The postmaster general expresses his hearty backing of this plan and has urged the full co-operation of his employees in the efforts to conserve the resources of this country as outlined in the president's proclamation of April 7, which proclamation set aside May 22-28 as forest protection week.

MANY DEAD LETTERS SENT FROM SALEM

Due to improper addresses, an average of 350 letters are sent to the dead letter office from Salem, according to Postmaster Huckenstein. About 1200 are returned to the writer because of incomplete address and about twice as many more have to be turned over to a special clerk to obtain the right address. Having failed to educate the adult public to write the complete address on a letter and also to give a return address, attempts are being made by postal authorities to inform the school children as to the necessity of doing so. Postmaster Huckenstein stated that he had already taken up the matter with the school authorities here.
