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ROOMING HOUSE PERMIT REVOKED BY COMMISSION

Man Convicted of Maintaining a Nuisance Will Not be Permitted to Run Hotel After July 1

Jack LaBine, proprietor of the Elite rooming house at the corner of Chestnut and Jefferson, appeared before the city commission last night on an order to show cause why his license should not be revoked. Failing to show cause his license was ordered revoked, effective July 1.

The cause for revocation of this license by the city was LaBine's recent conviction of maintaining a nuisance, LaBine having plead guilty to such a charge in Justice of the Peace Arthur C. Williams' court after his place had been raided by the police department and evidence found that he had been engaging in illicit liquor traffic. He was sentenced to a short jail term and ordered to pay a fine on his plea of guilty.

SALEM, June 23.—The Willamette valley berry growers sent out an urgent call for pickers today. Five thousand persons are needed. It is said. From one to two cents a pound has been offered for the picking of various varieties of berries and cherries.

CONTRACTS QUESTIONED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—H. B. Miller, formerly in charge of the sale of surplus materials for the shipping board on the Pacific coast, has entered contracts totalling from five to seven millions, the "nature of which might be open to question," Federal District Attorney Silva said today, in announcing that he would present the matter to the federal grand jury. Silva said that the Barde company, of Portland, was also drawn into the inquiry.

ICE CREAM VENDORS FAVORED IN LICENSES

The city ordinance reducing the license for ice cream peddlers passed its third reading at last night's meeting of the city commission. The ordinance reduces the rate ice cream peddlers must pay the city for the privilege of selling their wares from house to house to \$25 a quarter or \$10 a week. The ordinance covers this line of business only, all other peddlers coming under the general license ordinance which imposes a heavier license.

10 BUCKAROOS ARRESTED

age is not forced onto the shipper with permanent connections at the consumption point. The storage is 10 cents, and all told it becomes a heavy load. It might be explained that the diversion is so important because when a local shipper bills his stuff to Denver, for instance, he may find on reaching there that the market is off or glutted and he must move on with his car. He can do this twice, but the third time the freight rates become local in nature and of course shut off further movement of the car he has had trouble disposing of. Then he stores at a big cost.

The present market at Missouri river points ranges from \$1.50 to \$2. The cost plus freight charges on one box of apples that is raised in the Grande Ronde and shipped to the Missouri river, is \$1.50, approximately, a little more in fact. Hence it is readily seen in the light of these conditions, that yesterday's news of a readjustment is mighty big news to the local men who ship apples.

Just when details will be published is not made public.
