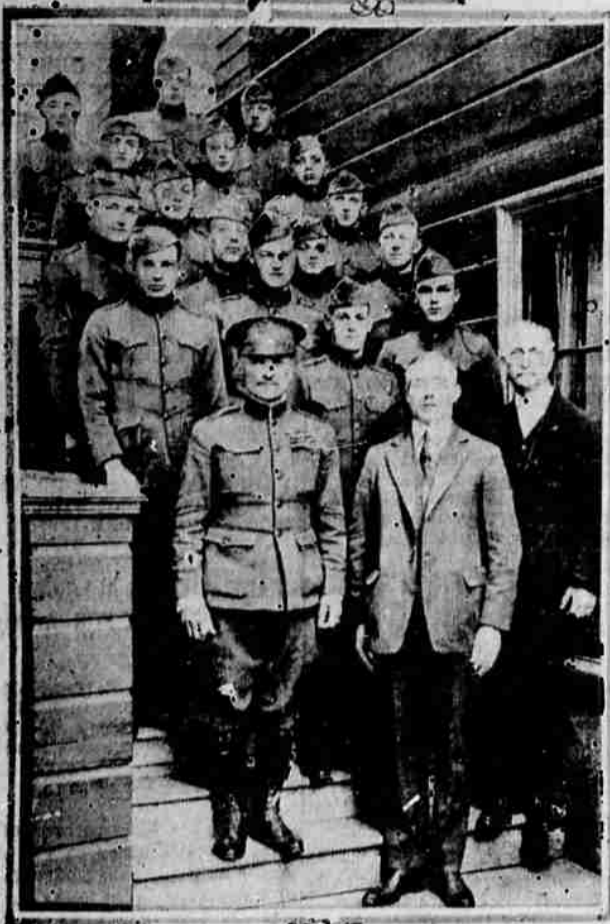

ARMY RECRUITS LEARN FAST

A squad of regular army men from Camp Travis, Texas, under the leadership of Lieutenant R. G. Gard, of Fort Myers, Virginia, were in La Grande today. The men are attached to the recruit educational center and are spending the summer with a Chautauqua company explaining the nature of the work their division is doing.

The recruit educational work was instituted when the draft revealed that there was a large number of men in the country unable to read or write and the detachment of men with the Chautauqua circuit represents men who have learned to read and write in the army, some of them not having been in the country over a year.

RUSSIAN TELLS GRUESOME TALES

PORTLAND, June 24.—After making his escape from Soviet-ruled Russia in a trunk carried on an American naval vessel, and then disguised as an able seaman, making his way to Japan and thence to this country, Elin Aikjorn, a Siberian and Russian business man, has arrived in Portland with a story of conditions in his country that would not sound well to the ears of Lemhi and Trouty.

According to his story Aikjorn was interested nine times in making his escape from Russia, because he would not consent to join the Bolshevik army. Aikjorn said he was a school nurse of Kerevsky in Petrograd 25 years ago.

Today Kerevsky is the man in whom the faith of the Russian people who desire to see right prevail, is centered," declares Aikjorn. "Kerevsky has the ability to lead, has the faith of the people, but lacked the nerve at the critical moment."

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 24.—The Greeks are shortening the Ismid front. As a result of the withdrawal of the eleventh Greek division, the nationalists captured Adabazar and Sabaja near Ismid, with any fighting.

CONTRACTORS TO START WORK

WORK BETWEEN BAKER AND LA GRANDE EMPLOYS 300.

Gravel for Ballast is to be Hauled From Pits on the Columbia River—To Start July 1.

BAKER, June 24.—Representatives of Clifton, Applegate & Towle, railroad contractors, have arrived in Baker to take charge of the right of way improvement work to be done this summer between Baker and La Grande. It is understood that 75 men will be started on the work within a few days and that when it is fully under way 300 men will be employed. The work here will be under charge of Mr. Gorman who is in Baker with a construction train, having his office on the train which is in the railroad yards at the depot.

Some weeks ago the Herald announced that work of installing the O-W R. & N. track between Baker and La Grande would be started soon after the arrival of the construction train at the time it is in accordance with that report. Active work will probably be under way by the first of July. Several months will be required to complete the work. Gravel for the ballast is understood to be hauled by trains from gravel pits on the Columbia river, and seven or eight trains will be used in transporting the gravel.
