WILL ILLUSTRATE WITH MODEL MINE

CHICAGO, June 24.—A model mine built under the supervision of government experts and illustrating the very latest facts of mine-working methods, will be one of the features of the National Exposition at Midway and Midway Park, Chicago, during the summer. The mine is being constructed by the American Mining Association in connection with its 30th annual convention to be held in Chicago, July 11-17.

From the entire workings of the mine, the visitors will be able to see the various stages of the mining process, from the discovery of the ore to the final shipment of the product.

According to tradition, the mine was built on the site of the first mine in the state, which was discovered in 1841. The mine is being constructed by the American Mining Association in connection with its 30th annual convention to be held in Chicago, July 11-17.

BAKER COUNTY GETS \$1298.93 FUND

BAKER, June 24.—According to the apportionment by Secretary of State Koser of county fair funds among the counties of the state Baker county will receive \$1298.93 and Grant county \$542.80.

This fund is raised by levy of one twentieth of a mill on the taxable property of the state and this year aggregates \$48,739.87. It is apportioned according to the levies of the counties.

As there is no fair held in Baker county the money received from this source will go to the general fund after the first of the year. It has been the custom to use a small portion of the money received from this source for the annual school fair.
