

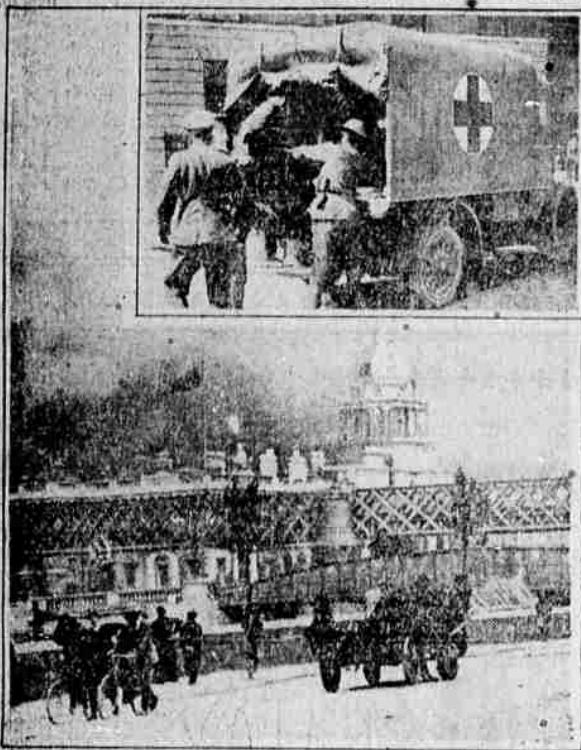

Americanization: By Hays



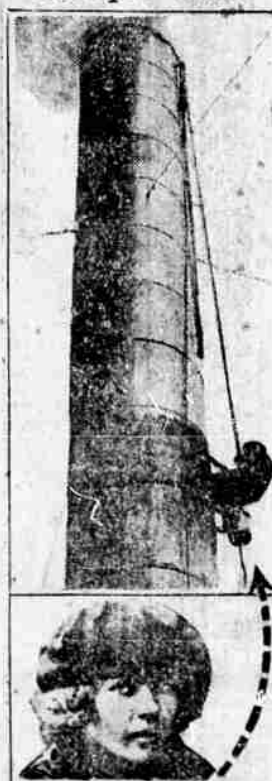
