BURN NOTES NEXT WEEK

CHAUTAUQUA BOARD HOLDS IMPORTANT MEETING.

Jubilation Meeting Will Be Held This Week Over the Burning of Back Notes and Securities.

Many matters of importance looking towards the comfort and welfare of chautauqua patrons were discussed at a meeting of the board of directors, held in the Y. M. C. A. last evening.

Some changes were made in the lighting facilities so that the tent lights will be kept hot all night.

A contract was entered into with an insurance company to underwrite the chautauqua against rain.

Will Burn Notes.
In view of the fact that the chautauqua has been able by persistent and hard work to remove indebtedness on the pavilion and is now ready to turn that structure over to the city, the membership is going to hold a jubilation some time during the week and there is going to be a burning of notes and other securities that have worried the directors these many years. George T. Cochran was appointed a committee to prepare a suitable program.

No Reserved Seats.
After prolonged and careful deliberation it was found impossible to provide reserved seats. The plan had been to do this without additional cost to the ticket holders, but so many things got in the way that the matter had to be dropped.

The question of providing sidewalks along the street leading to the park is one of the worst before the board. The city has torn up the walks, most of which were laid by the chautauqua association, in the first place, and conferences are being held today with a view of making a temporary arrangement.

Ticket Sale Tuesday.
The Neighborhood club committee held a meeting this afternoon preparatory to making the final canvas for membership tickets next Tuesday and Wednesday.

Chautauqua Opens Friday.
With a program that is proving popular as its details are becoming known, the chautauqua will open next Friday evening and from now on until then the board, and Manager W. C. Connor will be continually at it to have everything in readiness. The tent rentage has been brisk, but there are a few left.
