Besides his widow, he leaves to mourn his loss, two step-children, Mrs. Brown of this city, and Frank B. Evans of Anaheim, Cal., and six grandchildren, Mrs. Dexter McElroy, Ralph and Irene Poston, and Thelma, Esther and Harold Brown, all of this city.

The funeral will be held Friday in Dodge City.

# SENTENCE IS POSTPONED

NEW TRIAL ASKED FOR T. J. KEELER.

Motion for New Trial Asked—Evidence is Not Sufficient is One of Reasons For Request.

Passing of sentence in the case of the state vs. T. J. Keeler was postponed this morning by Judge J. W. Knowles in circuit court because of a motion filed by his attorneys for a new trial.

Keeler was charged with larceny in an indictment by the grand jury recently and last week a jury in circuit court found him guilty. His attorneys, R. J. Green and John S. Hodgins, asked for a new trial on the grounds that the evidence did not connect Keeler with the crime and because if any crime was committed it was not larceny, as the goods were taken by the man having them in custody, this crime being known as larceny by bailee.

# LIDGE NOT GUILTY OF PLOT TO BURN HOME

SPOKANE, Wash., July 5.—The acquittal of Louis Lidge, in the superior court here Wednesday, who was charged with first degree arson in connection with an alleged attempt to burn the D. C. Corbin home here in April, will not interfere with the trial of Mrs. Corbin on a similar charge July 6, according to Prosecuting Attorney Meyer.

Cheers greeted the Lidge verdict when it was read in the court after the jury had been out for about three hours. Lidge was arrested following an alleged confession by Mrs. Corbin detailing a purported plot between she and Lidge to burn the home and collect the insurance. Lidge maintained he knew nothing of the plot.
