OLD PIONEER PASSES AWAY

MRS. EVALINE BODDY CAME HERE IN 1865.

Was Oldest Sister of H. P. Lewis of This City—Funeral Held in Portland Yesterday.

Mrs. Evaline Boddy, old pioneer of this valley, who has been making her home in Portland of late, passed away at the home of her son, S. P. Campbell, in Portland, on July 3. Mrs. Boddy was 78 years of age at the time of her death, which resulted from pneumonia.

Coming to the Grande Ronde Valley in 1845, Mrs. Boddy had watched the growth and continued prosperity of the local vicinity. Her first marriage was to W. B. Campbell, and to this union five children were born.

The funeral was held in Portland yesterday afternoon. She leaves to mourn her loss, two daughters and one son. She was the oldest sister of H. P. Lewis of this city, who left Saturday evening to attend the funeral.
