Mrs. F. E. Divena and two children, Orville and Erna were up from La Grande visiting with Perry friends the latter part of the week.

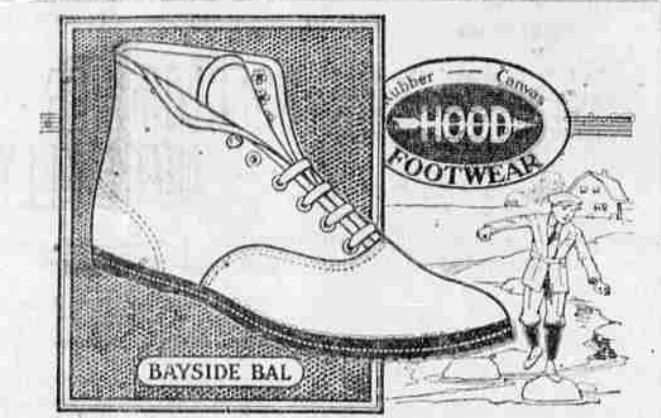
