

WILLAMETTE CROPS SUFFER

WHEAT AND STRAWBERRIES DISEASED.

Pathologist from O. A. C. Sees Better Conditions in Grande Ronde Valley Than On Coast.

Professor H. P. Barnes, plant pathologist of O. A. C., who was in La Grande recently for the purpose of making a study of plant diseases, is making an investigation of plant diseases in all parts of the state in connection with the extension work of the college.

In the Willamette valley farmers are having trouble with "Take-All" in their wheat fields. This disease stops the growth of the wheat and prevents its heading out, Barnes said. "I do not believe that in the dryer sections, such as Union county, there will be any trouble to speak of with this disease," he said.

While here he investigated the trouble that has been reported from several places with strawberries. In this connection, he made the following statement: "The strawberry in the Willamette valley this year suffered considerably from the winter. The ground was soaked with water so long that the roots went to base rotting off. Strawberries require a well-drained soil and I do not believe that much trouble of this sort will be found here although it is possible that the few cases where disease is reported here are due to this cause. However, there are many other diseases that strawberries are subject to and whatever is wrong with the berries here we want to help the growers to eradicate it."
