he was playing in Denver. He was on his way to the hotel, when he saw a tall, lanky fellow, with no apparent leaning up against a lamp post.

"Mr. Libbey," he said, "I have a little song here I wish you could sing. Two poor letter carriers wrote it and I've put all my savings into it to publish it. I'll sing it for you."

Libbey didn't wait to hear the song, but took the manuscript to his hotel. The title of it was "Where the Sirey Colorado Winds Its Way." Libbey introduced it the next week and started it on its way to prosperity.
