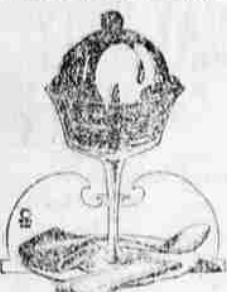

### State News

The bids for the construction of the new wing for the State Hospital will be opened in Salem July 12 at the office of the board of control. The funds for the wing total \$160,000 and of this sum, about \$145,000 is to be used in construction. The remainder will be used for furnishings, but the contracts for them will not be let until the building is nearing completion. The contracts will be let from the hospital in Pendleton.

Umatilla county's wheat average this year is estimated by Fred Bonnia, county agent, at 226,000. This is the same as last year's average. There is very little spring wheat this year.

Fire which had its origin in a spark from an engine on No. 18 destroyed the big warehouse of the Pacific Coast Elevator Company at Mission, Umatilla county, this week. Damage done approximated \$10,000.

**The Phoebe of the Flycatcher Family**  
The phoebe, a small, grayish-brown bird, belongs to the flycatcher family. It takes its name from its monotonous call, "pewee, phoebe, phoebe, pewee," continuously repeated, as it flies about in search of a habitation. The phoebe preys on insects, which it captures while on the wing, and is therefore of benefit to farmers. The common phoebe is also known as pewee and as pewit. It, however, should not be confused with the wood pewee, which is a different species of flycatcher.

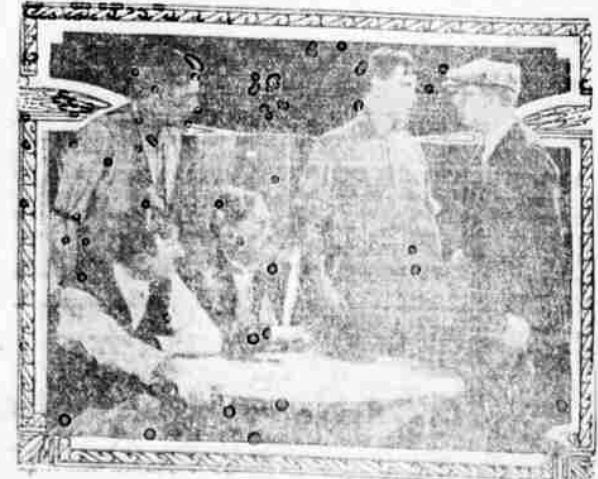
