RECORD CROWDS AT CHAUTAUQUA

Stefansson Gives Lecture Presented to Ad Club Last Year—Afternoon Lecturer Lacked Punch.

Record audiences for the 1921 Chautauqua assembly, with a big gathering of people in the park all day, enjoyable weather and a happy consequence of a concourse of people under pleasant environments featured yesterday's festivities at Riverside park.

During the morning a religious atmosphere was attained when Rev. James Leitch of Island City conducted religious services for the campers and others who might want to attend the open air meetings. All day long the picnicers were congregated, some to lounge about and rest in the wonderland of the Eastern Oregon, and others to take every advantage of the chautauqua program.

Two Ladies Win Favor—

It is a safe wager that two more popular girls have never come to the chautauqua here, than the Roach-Freeman duo. They appeared but once, unfortunately, yet those who heard them Saturday afternoon, are still holding their aching sides. As clean-cut entertainers they are wonderful and in a class all by themselves. They can come back any time they want to and get a big hearing.

Unfortunately circumstances prevented their appearance in the evening. Congressman Rainey was eliminated from the chautauqua circuit just before reaching La Grande and because Explorer Stefansson was in the city—this being his regular night on the Ellison-White Chautauqua, he was used in Rainey's place. Stefansson was not booked for La Grande because he has been here so recently and Rainey was sent as a substitute for La Grande only—but he didn't come and the explorer gave the lecture that he gave the Ad club last winter. To those who had not heard him, his talk was very interesting and instructive. But his number is so long that the Roach-Freeman duo could not be put on. The fact that they were not to appear at night was not generally understood until the program began.

Sunday had its ups and downs. Dr. J. F. Jenness had the afternoon lecture program. His address had no punch to the majority, though some found much of interest. He failed to please a vast majority. It is, of course, impossible to have all thirteen numbers please a majority of the people—there are always some that are not pleased, but when the big majority are satisfied that approaches perfection. Dr. Jenness did not reach the majority by any means. His message is mediocre and commonplace and his personality lacks the chautauqua spirit.

But in the evening! With a first tenor and a bass that rank far above the average, and splendid piano accompanist and popular entertainer in the second tenor and baritone parts the Orpheus quartet lived up to its advertising. Their numbers are extremely well selected ranging from the sublime to the light and frivolous. The pavilion was packed and if there was a single person that was not satisfied, he is keeping quite still about it. The Orpheus Quartet is another company that can come back to La Grande any time it wants to—there will be a crowd out to hear them.

J. H. ACKERMAN DIES SUDDENLY

PASSES AWAY AT HOME SUNDAY MORNING.

Has Been President of Oregon Normal at Monmouth for the Past Ten Years.

MONMOUTH, Ore., July 11.—J. H. Ackerman, president of the Oregon Normal school at Monmouth and prominent educator of the state for the last 25 years, died suddenly Sunday morning following a stroke of apoplexy.

Mr. Ackerman had been president of the normal for the last 10 years and previous to that was state superintendent of public instruction in Oregon for 12 years.

He was born in Toronto, Iowa, November 7, 1855.
