tax paying time so that it would be possible to know whether the city had the money to do the work.

Cost May Be Lower.

The cost to the city would be \$6,000 to \$8,000 and Mr. Lottridge pointed out that if his company rebuilt the line on Adams avenue this year and the city wanted to move it next year at its own expense it would then probably build its new system from \$500 to \$700 cheaper because of the probable reduction in labor and materials. The moving cost would be between \$1000 to \$1200, according to Lottridge's estimate, making an additional expense in spite of the reduction in installation cost.

FEW GET JOBS FOR SIX MONTHS

ONLY 20,282 ARE ACCOMMODATED EARLY PART OF YEAR

During the Same Period Last Year, 52,909 Were placed in Positions, With Better Salaries

SALEM, OR., July 14.—Only 20,282 persons were furnished work by Oregon employment agencies during the first six months of 1921.

Fifty-two thousand, nine hundred and sixty-nine were placed in positions during the same period last year—and they got considerably better wages in 1920.

These are the figures in a statement made public by C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

More than 100 per cent more men were placed in the month of June, 1920, than received employment last month. One year ago 8452 were given jobs. Last month but 3631 found employment through agencies.

Carpenters who last year received approximately \$7.14 per day are paid about \$6.18; teamsters who got \$5.08 are receiving \$3.62; head fallers who earned \$6.71 in 1920 year are drawing \$4.73; second fallers who earned \$5.71 in 1920 now get \$4.50; laborers who received \$4.96 last year are paid \$3.32.

Camp cooks, who once received \$137.69 per month, together with board, find their checks average but \$97.89 with board. Dish washers who got \$77.25 and their food, still get their board, but with only \$53.69 in pay. Farm hands whose checks last year average about \$75.62 plus three squares now get but \$44.60 and board. So it is also with millers, whose \$88.33 plus board has slumped to \$55 and sustenance.

MAN GRIPS BOY. DEMANDS MONEY

SEATTLE, July 14.—Two bandits shortly after ten o'clock this morning, stole a bag containing \$25,000 in currency from a messenger for the Northwest Trust and Safe Deposit company, and escaped in an automobile, pursued by a taxicab called by the messenger.

The police were notified and took up the chase. The messenger said that a bandit gripped him around the neck, pushed a pistol against his ear and told him to "drop it," which he did.

BRIDGE WORK IS STARTED
