YAKIMA MAN DIES HERE

FATHER OF MRS. BERT PICKENS PASSES AWAY.
Was Civil War Veteran and Had Been Visiting Here—Successors After A Short Illness.

Albert Livingstone Miller, father of Mrs. Bert Pickens of this city, died at the home of his daughter yesterday afternoon at about four o'clock, following an illness of two days. Mr. Miller had been visiting here for about a month.

His home was in Yakima, Washington. He was a widower and besides Mrs. Pickens, two other daughters survive him. They are Miss Alle Miller and Mrs. Chasess who reside in the state of Maine.

Mr. Miller was a veteran of the Civil War and was severely wounded during that conflict. He was 79 years of age and was a retired farmer. The body will be shipped to Yakima, Washington, for burial.

The remains are at the Bohnenkamp chapel.
