SUCUMBING TO SIX YEAR ILLNESS

Had Lived in Oregon For Forty Years; Is Survived By Four Daughters

John A. Padon passed away this morning at his home, 1201 D. street, after an illness of six years, at the age of 66 years, having been born in Brown county, Kansas, in 1855. He came to Oregon forty years ago and has resided in this state since that time. He was married to Earnestine Hill in 1889.

Besides his widow, four daughters survive. They are Mrs. Lillie M. Conrad, of La Grande; Mrs. Earnest Ratchey, of Spokane, Washington; Mrs. William Zeigler and Mrs. Roy Kurtz, both of this city. A sister, residing at Winslow, Washington, and many grandchildren also survive him. Other relatives reside in Texas.

Definite arrangements have not been made for the funeral, but it will probably be held at the Henry chapel at two o'clock Sunday afternoon. Interment will be made in the Masonic cemetery.

RED CROSS MAKES APPEAL

FURTHER CONTRIBUTIONS TO COLORADO ASKED

Additional Quarter Million Dollars Needed to Relieve Pueblo Situation.

An appeal for an additional \$250,000 for relief work in the flood swept area in and about Pueblo, Colorado, has been received by Mrs. Fay Catlin, executive secretary of the Red Cross. The appeal comes from J. E. Orlinton, division manager of the Red Cross and is an appeal to chapters in all parts of the country.

Mr. Orlinton's communication, which is based on a report from W. Frank Parsons, vice-chairman of the American Red Cross, says: "The governor of Colorado and citizens of Pueblo and La Junta have full confidence in the Red Cross and relief work in both places is fully in its charge."

"There is now no need for guesses or misunderstandings. The need is great and the facts are clear. There are 2025 families in the Pueblo district alone, and 139 more in the La Junta area who need help in varying degrees. Most of these families have lost their furniture, bedding and clothing. Many have lost the houses which they owned in whole or in part."

"In the Red Cross relief fund there is now \$300,000 in cash. Making due allowance for all supplementary funds of a local or special nature, at least \$250,000 more is imperative if the conditions and the means of self support are restored to those who have lost all."

"I shall be glad if you will send these facts to the chapters in your Division and urge that all money collected or donated by the chapters be turned in promptly to your office. In any event, full information should be sent here of the contributions made or acknowledged by each chapter."

"Let me request that you act promptly in this matter because a dollar at this time is of much more value than more at a later period. The Red Cross is in complete control of all relief with disaster experts at work. It is our belief that every dollar subscribed will provide a dollar's worth of relief."

Mrs. Catlin states that contributions received at her office for the relief work will be immediately forwarded to Colorado in order that the money may be used for the purpose for which it is intended.

Removing Ink Stains. Pyrophosphate of soda is recommended for the removal of ink stains. This salt does not injure vegetable fiber and yields colorless compounds with the ferric oxide of the ink. It is best to first apply talcum to the ink spot, then wash in a solution of pyrophosphate until both talcum and ink have disappeared. Another formula is to use a mixture of four parts of tannin and two parts of powdered alum. This is not injurious to cloth. Other stains also may be removed with it.
