RESURVEY TO BEGIN MONDAY

ENGINEER ENGAGED TO SUPERVISE WORK.

Much Money Will Be Saved in Future in Improvement Work by New Survey.

The resurvey of the city of La Grande will start Monday, according to announcement by City Manager George Garrett. O. A. Kratz, a civil engineer who now has headquarters at Ontario, has been engaged for this work by the city. Mr. Kratz was formerly chief of construction of the department of public works of Portland, and was also chief draftsman for the city of Portland for a time. When the resurvey of Portland was made he had complete charge of that work.

At present he is engaged in engineering work connected with irrigation and drainage projects in the Ontario section. He will supervise the work here although he did not do the actual field work himself, having a competent transit man in charge of the field work.

"The resurvey of La Grande is a project that will have thousands of dollars to the taxpayers during the coming years," Mr. Garrett declared today in discussing the purpose of the resurvey. "Adequate monuments do not exist now in a several cases inaccurate work in laying out additions or running lines later has resulted in much trouble. The survey work connected with building sidewalks and preparing for street improvement work is now almost troubled because if surveyors are to do the work accurately much work that is involved because of the lack of proper monuments."

"Mr. Kratz is, I believe, one of the best men in the state to supervise this work. It would not be possible for the city to ask him to come here and spend all his time on the ground but in having him act in a supervisory capacity we are assured of having the work done properly and in such a manner that the new lines will return benefits in much money saved in the future."

In Stock Shipping—

STANDARDS OF EDUCATION

means a larger and broader Americanism.

"So far as equalizing the opportunity of education for all children of the nation makes it necessary, a national educational program should be put into effect but there was no disposition on the part of the educational leadership of the United States to have the national government assume any functions of the states in the administration of the programs in the various states, but they do feel that it is the duty of the federal government to formulate a definite program national in its scope, which, in co-operation with the states, will insure an equal opportunity to all children of the nation."

"This plan provides for the establishment of a department of education with a secretary in the president's cabinet."

Legion Meets With N. E. A.

When asked what in his opinion was the action taken by the N. E. A., so far as results to be realized in the future are concerned, Mr. Hampton said this is to be found in the meeting of the board of directors and the national committee for Americanization of the American Legion. The representatives of the Legion came to the N. E. A. directors with the attitude of "what can we do to help in carrying out the proper program?"

"The board of directors made very definite recommendations in this matter of Americanization," Mr. Hampton continued. "Among these recommendations was that American history and civics should be made a requirement for graduation from both the elementary and high schools. Another important recommendation made was that the English language be made the basic language for all instruction from the kindergarten through the university."

"Two other very important decisions reached are regarding qualifications for teachers' salaries. Qualifications should be raised so that every teacher shall have professional training for at least two years after completing a standard high school course."

Good Salaries Favored.

"Salaries should be placed on such a basis as to insure that people of the right calibre and character will enter the profession, according to

the sentiment of the assembly. "The general opinion of all present was that there cannot and must not be any loosening on the part of the people in carrying out the educational program of the country."
