### BIG STILL IS LOCATED

Sheriff Warnick Assists in Raid on McKay Creek Institution

PENDLETON, July 18—John Smith, resident of the McKay creek district, arrested yesterday afternoon on his ranch, about 20 miles south of this city, on a charge of manufacturing and having intoxicating liquor in his possession, was held for the action of the county court and his bail set at \$500 this morning by Magistrate Thomas Fitz Gerald, justice of the peace. His hearing was set for Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock before County Judge E. L. Schanep. Several attempts to secure his liberty failed.

The largest still taken during the past few months was brought into "captivity" as a result of the raid made near Smith's place. The brew outfit had a capacity of 50 gallons, and 30 gallons of whiskey and about 400 gallons of mash that were in fermentation were found. Most of the liquor was thrown away by the authorities, when the outfit was hauled to town in a truck. The cooking vat for the mash was of wood with a lining made of sheet metal.

Included in the raiding party were Deputy Sheriffs E. B. F. Ridgeway, Wes Spears and William Lyday, Major E. L. Swartzlander and Sheriff Lee Warnick of Union county. The still was cleverly hidden in a dense thicket, and a long search was necessary before the hiding place was revealed.

Belief that this still might have been the same one that was taken from the court house yard more than a year ago was dispelled when the statement from the sheriff's office was made to the effect that this still was a wooden one and the one stolen was a copper outfit.
